A. [9154-17](#) Approval of Minutes from February 9, 2017 meeting

B. 9178-17 North Mesa Stable Discussion

Presenters: Christopher Wilson

Olga Chertkov presented her concerns on the Horse Stables which included soil issues, flies, smell, and view of the stables. She also mentioned that even though the sidewalks prohibit horseback riding, people still ride on them. She feels that Los Alamos County needs to adopt regulations, as the surrounding counties have in regards to the stables. Ms. Chertkov provided copies of the County's (Colorado State University) soil tests and presented her conclusions on these results.

Mr. James Whitehead, President of the Los Alamos Stable Owner's Association, expressed his interest in the topic and addressed the concerns raised by Ms. Chertkov. Mr. Whitehead stated that they are working with the Parks & Recreation Department to follow regulations and encouraged the Parks and Recreation Board to add a Horse Stable subcommittee.

Olga Chertkov commented that she would like to include two more tests: an additional one on the soil and one for the air quality at both Los Alamos Middle School and Barranca Elementary.

Member Russell asked if a drainage plan was in place. Chris Wilson replied that one was recently completed with the help of Public Works.

Mr. Wilson also asked if any of the Board Members were interested in helping assist with these concerns. Member Dattelbaum expressed interest in helping. Mr. Wilson, in response to Member Dattelbaum's request to hold a public discussion, stated that he would add it to an upcoming meeting.

Councilor Sheehey addressed Ms. Chertkov's comments and mentioned that the County Council has appointed someone to look into the laydown area, as the concern was also brought to the Council's attention.

C. 9179-17 Bond Update

Presenters: Brian Brogan

Brian Brogan, Director of Community Services, gave a presentation with updated information on the 2017 Bond Project which included maps, conceptual designs and operating costs.

Chris Wilson answered questions regarding design and explained the use of subcommittees as they pertain to the Bond Projects.

Member Dattelbaum asked about the timing of the construction process. Brian Brogan responded that the projects wouldn't all be started at the same time. Chris Wilson also explained that some of the smaller projects would probably begin earlier than the larger ones. Brian Brogan explained that the recreation center would take 9-12 months to design.

Member Hand mentioned the tax estimator on the Bond Project website [<https://losalamosbondprojects2017.com>] is a great tool in determining the amount of tax a given household would incur if the bond projects passed.

Member Nakhleh asked about the possible operating cost offset from the Pajarito bond retirement cliffs. Brian Brogan responded they were separate projects and that it was undetermined at this time.

Eric Loechell asked about building to LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) standards and Brian Brogan responded that it has been discussed and would fall into budget discussions.

Olga Cherkov expressed concern about the lack of soccer field lighting and if there are any plans for improvements. Brian Brogan explained to her that it wasn't part of this project but could get back to her on what is planned.

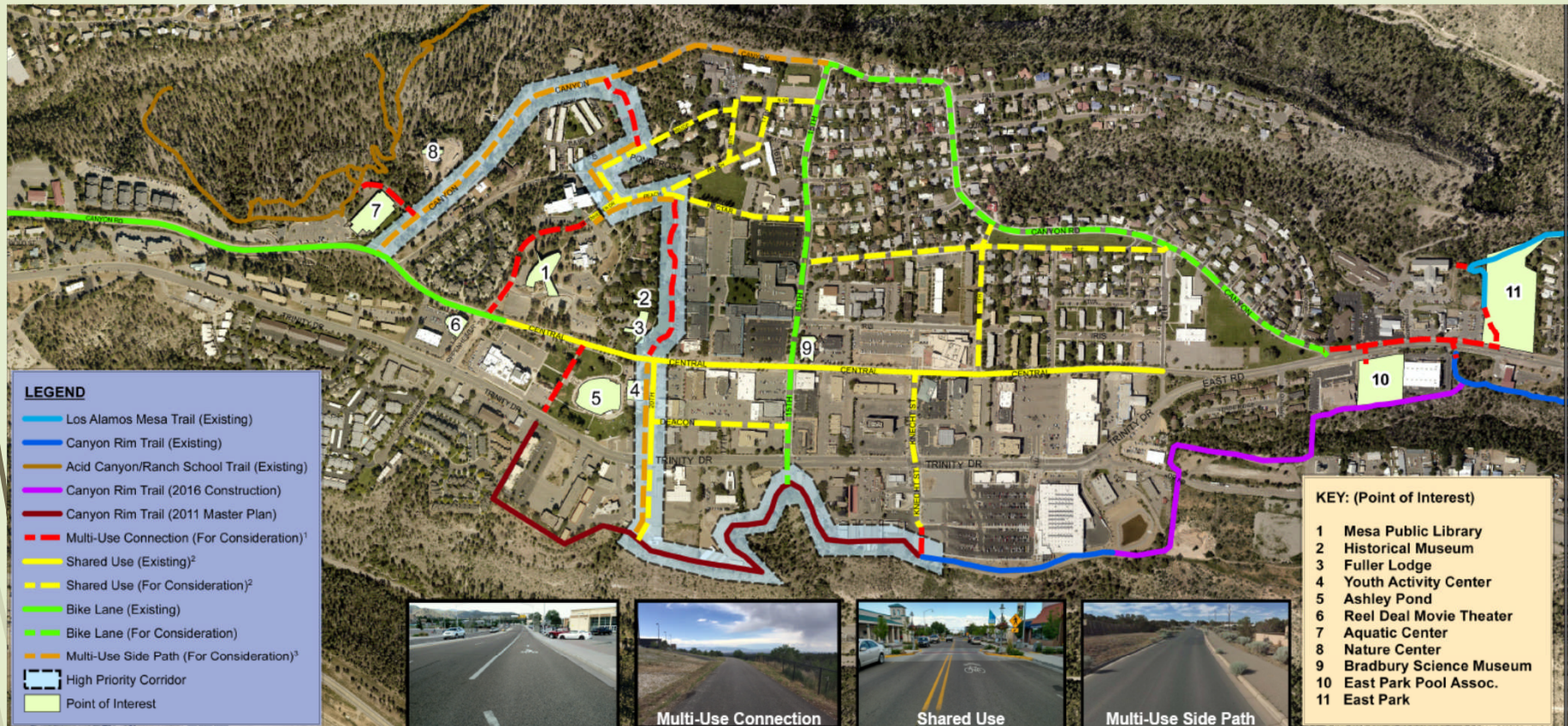

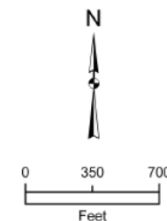

²**Shared Use** – A lane of traveled way that is open to both bicycle and motor vehicle travel.

³**Multi-Use Sidepath** – A path located immediately adjacent and parallel to a roadway. Multi-use sidepaths may be used by pedestrians, skaters, wheelchair users, joggers, and other non-motorized users. Most multi-use side paths are designed for two-way travel.

Body

More than half of the U.S. population lives within five miles of their workplace, making bicycling a feasible and fun way to get to the office. With increased interest in healthy, sustainable and economic transportation options, it's not surprising that, from 2000 to 2011, the number of bicycle commuters in the U.S. grew by more than 47 percent!

Hundreds of American communities have increased bicycle commuters by working to create a more Bicycle Friendly America, providing encouragement programs and events, like Bike to Work Day.

And that effort makes a difference: According to a study by the San Diego Association of Governments, one out of five people participated in the Bike to Work Day promotion as first-time commuters became regular bike commuters.

.. Fiscal and Staff Impact/Unplanned Item

It is not anticipated that the event would require specific funding, however it will likely require staff, volunteer and community effort. The level of effort and/or costs of such staff time is undetermined at this time.



- During the October 25, 2016 Work Session Councilor Izraelevitz motioned for the County to utilize \$50,000 of the \$500,000 previously earmarked for mountain bike trails on Pajarito Mountain currently contained in the CIP funds to pursue a pilot project on demonstrating the construction and maintenance of a mountain bike flow trail on County land.



What is a Flow Trail?

Definition and Criteria

- 
- Flow Trails take mountain bikers on a terrain-induced roller coaster experience, with little pedaling and braking necessary. This style of trail typically contains features like banked turns, rolling terrain, various types of jumps, and consistent and predictable surfaces. Conspicuously absent are abrupt corners or unforeseen obstacles. As a rider carves back and forth, and up and down, he or she develops a rhythm and *flows* down the trail.
 - Characteristics of a flow trail include, Synergy with landscape, Opposition to user forces, Conservation of momentum and Leading the user forward.
 - Other guidelines for a Flow trail include, accessibility , forgiveness and consistency.

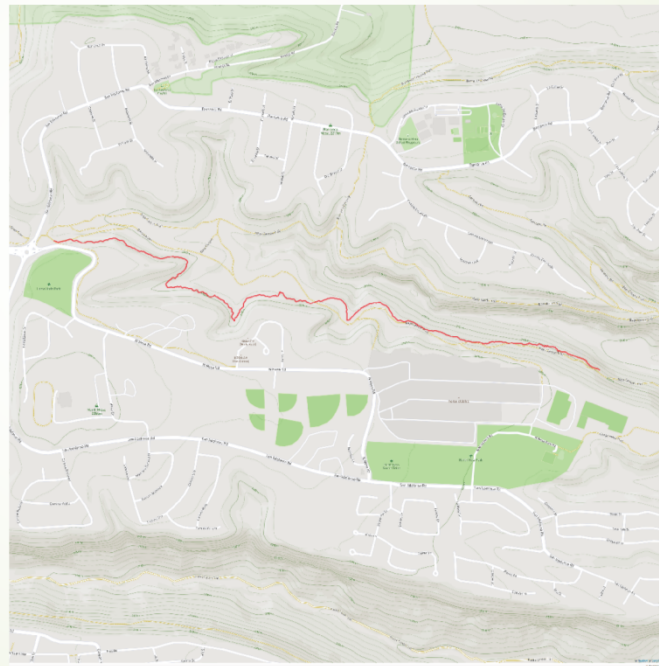


Economic Benefits

- This project will help attain International Mountain Bike Association Bronze Level Ride Center designation
- Invites Economic vitality and Quality of Life
- Los Alamos has 9 months of mountain biking
- The development of mountain bike trail networks can provide economic benefits to a community, based on a foundation of sustainably designed and constructed trails. There are many examples where the development of mountain bike trail systems has led to significant economic development, including:
 - Mountain bikers contribute an estimated \$25 million to the Fruita, Colorado economy, approximately 15% of the annual budget for Mesa County¹
 - In 2010, mountain bike trails at Raystown Lake, Pennsylvania attracted more than 25,000 visitors, 2.5 times more than predicted. Visiting riders spent on average \$98 for a day visit, and \$227 for an overnight visit. Mountain bikers brought \$1.2 million in spending to the region²
 - The Intrepid Trails system in Grand County, Utah brought in \$25,000 in state park revenue the first year it was open (2009). The same year, 179,157 people visited Dead Horse Point State Park producing an economic impact of \$4.1 million³

Bayo Canyon Trailhead to NM 502 "Y"




Proposed Flow Trail Master Plan

Corridor - Guaje Point To the NM 502 "Y"



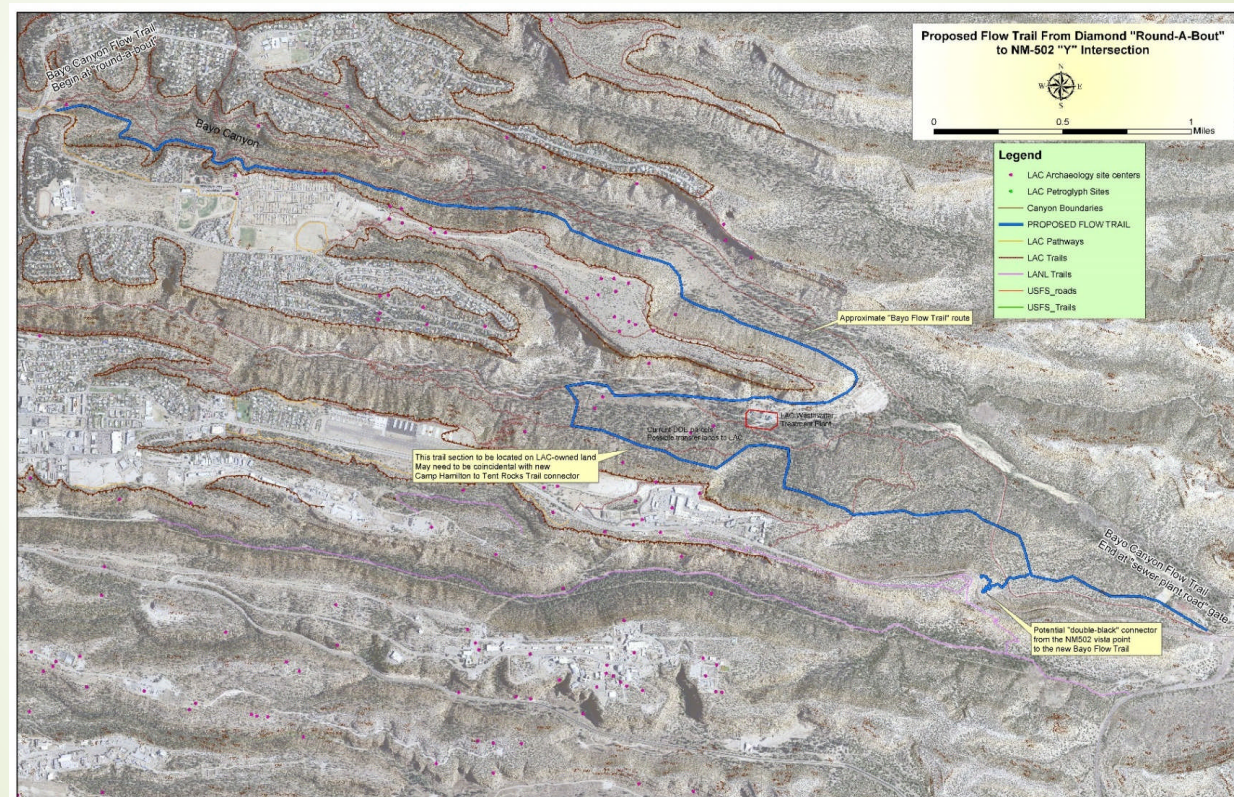

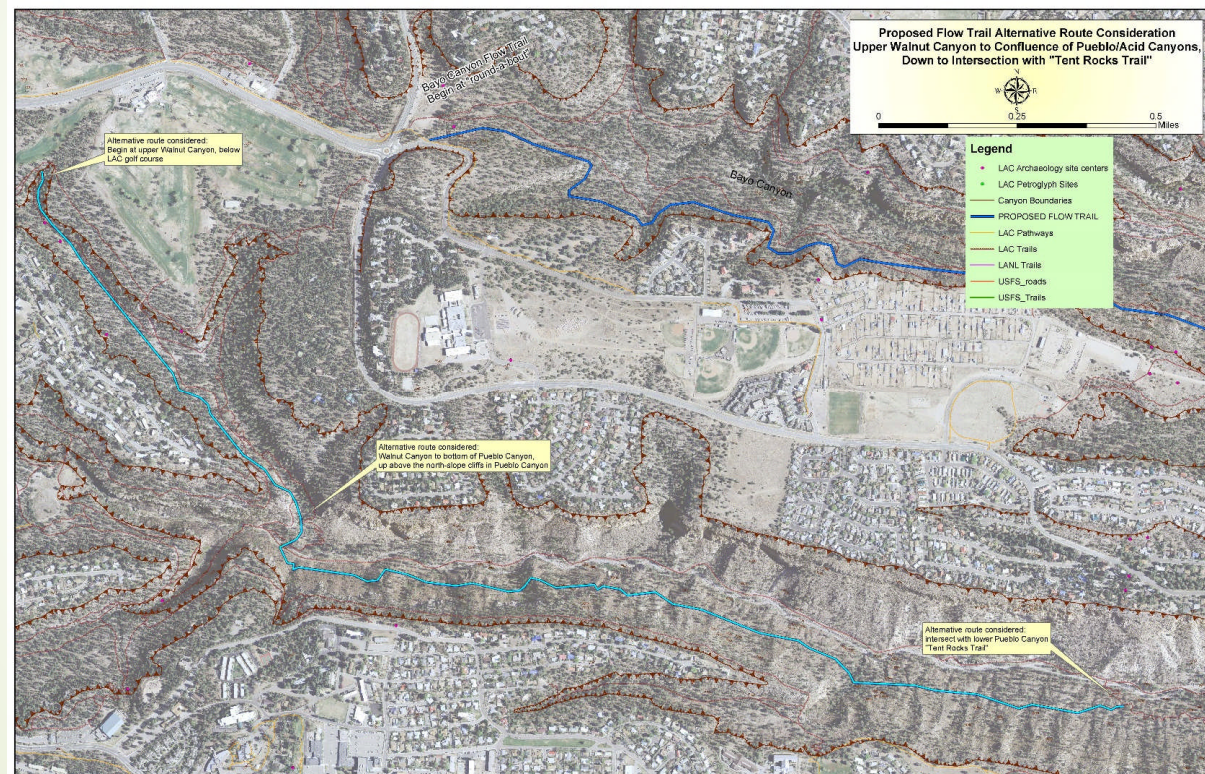

Recreation Report – March 2017

Ice Rink End of Season Projects: 90% Complete – Staff has finished end of season projects to switch the Rink over from Winter to Spring/Summer programming. Yearly maintenance has been mostly completed and we are addressing the concrete upheaval at the east end of the concrete slab by the Zamboni (Zam) garage.



Roller Derby Season Begins, April 1st: The Derby Dames (Adult League) and the Cherry Bombs (Jr. League) will be back at the Rink beginning April 1st with weekday and weekend practices.



Kha'p'o Community School Swim Lessons, March, 23 Students: The Kha'p'o Community School from Santa Clara Pueblo brought 23 kids for lessons on Tuesday afternoons during the month of March. They had a great time and learned lifesaving skills.

Los Alamos High School Freshmen PE Swim Lessons, March, 309 Students: The High School Freshmen PE classes finished their lessons on Thursday, March 23rd. Not only did the kids swim, but they learned Hands-Only CPR and Water Safety. They also enjoyed water aerobics/line dancing in the shallow end of the pool. AHA moments from regular pool patrons on how

well the program was organized, and the P.E. coaches even got up and danced on the pool edge during aerobics.



Lifeguard Certification Class, March 18, 21 Enrolled –We taught two American Red Cross Lifeguard classes this month. All the attendees did a great job and we hope you will see them all on the lifeguard stand this summer at our pool.

Golf Course Naturalization Project, 100% complete:
