Title

Discussion and Possible Action on the Filling of Councilor Vacancy.

Recommended Action

I nominate Morris B. Pongratz, Brady Burke, David M. North, Laura A. Crotzer, Aaron Walker, and K. Michael Cleveland to fill one vacancy on the County Council and move that Council appoint one nominee to the vacant position as follows:

By roll call vote, Councilors vote for one nominee and the nominee with the highest vote total of four or more be appointed to fill the remainder of the term beginning on January 1, 2014 and ending on December 31, 2018.

Body

The purpose of this evening's special session is to fill a vacancy on the Council after the resignation of Councilor James Chrobocinski in May. According to the County Charter, Section 200.4: "When a vacancy occurs in the Council, the remaining Councilors shall appoint a qualified person to fill it for the remainder of the unexpired term. If the vacancy occurs within ninety (90) calendar days prior to the expiration of the term, no such appointment shall be made."

Applicants were asked to submit a "letter of interest" stating that they were a qualified voter and resided in the County, along with a summary of their experience, background and any other qualifications that they felt made them the best candidate. The vacancy was advertised in the Los Alamos Monitor, Daily Post and with KRSN radio, in addition to information displayed on the County Facebook Page, webpage postings and "County Line" e-newsletter postings.

Letter of Intent

I am interested in serving out the unexpired term of James Chrobocinski.

The following excerpt from John Donne's "Devotions Upon Emergent Occasions," Meditation XVII" describes my interest in public service:

"No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less, as well as if a promontory were, as well as if a manor of thy friend's or of thine own were: any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind, and therefore never send to know for whom the bells tolls; it tolls for thee."

I last held elected office in 2007, but unlike General Macarthur's old soldier I have tried to not "fade away". I "really retired" from LANL on March 31, 2018 and find that I have time for more public service. James' vacancy presents an opportunity to intensify my community service in an area where I have knowledge and experience.

- Six times the voters of elected me to represent them on the County Council.
- Combined with my four years' service on the Los Alamos Board of Education I have the knowledge gained from reviewing, modifying and ultimately approving 18 governmental budgets.
- In those offices I also have experience in negotiating with the Department of Energy to obtain financial compensation for the impact of the department upon our community.

This expression of interest has three parts: my recent involvement in the Los Alamos community, some highlights of my previous service as an elected official, and a Curriculum Vitae.

Recent involvement in the Los Alamos community

It is important to know that a potential candidate is "well-grounded" in the community and exposed to input from a diverse citizenry. I have had a long-standing interest in the welfare of the youth of Los Alamos so most of my time has been spent working with our young folks. Along with Don Casperson and Kathy Boerigter I serve as Kiwanis Advisor to the Los Alamos High School Key Club. At our recent Southwest District Key Club Convention our students nominated me for and I received the "Outstanding Kiwanis Advisor Award". During the school year I meet with all the Key Club members weekly and with our student board of directors at least monthly.

For a number of years, I have with working with the United Way of Northern New Mexico by recruiting members for and assisting with the United Way Youth team. The

students produce several fund-raising events. They include "Dinner over Diamond", "High Tea on the Hill' and "Hamburger Nite". The money raised by the students is used to fund leadership programs at the high school.

I was a member of the 2005 Leadership Los Alamos (LLA) class. For a number of years LLA sponsored Los Alamos Youth Leaders (LAYL). I served as an adult Team Leader for that effort. LAYL students learned leadership by producing projects – learning by doing, not from lectures. In cooperation with the LAFD we produced the Homecoming bonfires. We also produced LA Wild Day where high school students organized a fun day for elementary school students. Tragically one of the members of my team committed suicide.

I have served as public address announcer for LAPS athletic events since the final Cumbres-Pueblo football game in the mid-80's. You have a great view of the action, but you only get to know the students via a number on their jersey, not personally. The high school athletic department named me to their Athletics Hall-of-Fame.

I am a charter member and member of the Board of Directors of the LAPS Foundation. With help from the LANL Foundation we formed the LAPS Foundation to make up for shortcomings in the funds available to provide excellent schools. Currently I serve as secretary to the board. Last year we celebrated raising and distributing over a million dollars to our public schools. I have also served on the Aspen Elementary Advisory Council. We worked with the architect to design the new building for Aspen.

I am a charter member and member of the Board of Directors of the Los Alamos Faith and Science Forum. It is a multi-denominational, 501 C(3) corporation formed to demonstrate the compatibility of faith and science. We present a series of talks on faith and science each summer.

I am a member of the Kiwanis Club of Los Alamos. I am also on the Kiwanis Board of Directors. Our community service includes the Fourth of July Fireworks, Breakfast with Santa, and a Christmas party for the foster children in our three-county region.

I have been a member of the Los Alamos Community Health Council (CHC) for several years. I did serve as vice-chair for a few terms. I also serve on CHC's Youth Resiliency Committee chaired by Kristine Coblentz. For many years I served on the county's DWI Planning committee. Once three of us went "bar hopping" to ask bar-tenders how to best reduce DWI offenses.

I have also served on two charter review committees. I am quite familiar with the charter.

I am a lector and eucharistic minister for my church. I used to work with our youth group but ran out of time.

Highlights of my previous service as an elected official

Shakespeare's Antonio said "What's past is prologue" so my previous actions as an elected official may give some hint of my future service; however, a word of caution, I am/was fairly pragmatic in my decision making and changing facts must be recognized. In my first council term I was able to get the council to endorse the concept of county sponsorship of "social" (as opposed to athletic) recreation for our youth. Working with police detective Greg Talley, we got "Youth Working for Youth" (YWY) off and running. The idea was to combat drugs, alcohol and suicide among our youth with E.A.S.E. (Education, Alternatives, Sanctions and Example). I think that the resolution recognizing YWY as a county board got lost in a re-codification.

That first county council passed Los Alamos' first municipal gross receipts tax. While I was council chair in 1985 we approved the \$115 million electric generation bonds. We also approved the construction of the Larry Walkup Aquatic Center. Thanks to Sid Singer funding for the project came from back gross receipts taxes owed by the Zia Corporation; we got the DOE to acknowledge the obligation.

While on council in the 90's we entered into negotiations with the DOE and our congressional delegation regarding the assistance payments to the county. Los Alamos was the last local government getting assistance payments and annual renewal was a challenge for our delegation. We managed to get a "buy-out" of future payments. I believe that this money became our first major reserve fund. Working with the delegation we also managed to get the DOE to release land to the county. We also began our "self-sufficiency" efforts to include the building next to the TA-3 fire station.

While on council I was the county's representative on the National League of Cities Energy, Environment and Natural Resources (EENR) Steering Committee. I also served on the New Mexico Municipal League's Self-Insurance board.

Near the end of my last term on council and during my service on the school board we worked to vacate the school and county properties on Trinity Drive. While on school board we got the process started, but it took the joint efforts of subsequent school boards and council to see the project through to fruition. The final result is the Smith's Marketplace and the Camino Entrada county/school facilities.

While on the school board we worked with the congressional delegation and especially Ed McGaffigan from Senator Bingaman's office to ensure continued DOE funding for our schools. While that support is not inflation-adjusted it comes through the LANL contract via the defense appropriations act and has stood the test of time. It is vital for our schools.

When I was on the school board I worked with Judge Alan Kirk to draft by-laws for the Juvenile Justice Advisory Board (JJAB). We got the by-laws approved by the school board and the county council. I served as the first vice-chair for JJAB.



Dear County Manager Harry Burgess -

I wish to volunteer my name for consideration in filling the vacancy on County Council created by the recent resignation of Councilor James Chrobocinski.

Background:

I have lived in Los Alamos for just over 30 years. I arrived as a young unmarried woman fresh out of graduate school at UC Berkeley with degrees in nuclear and mechanical engineering. I was employed as a staff member in the field of computational physics in several divisions at Los Alamos National Laboratory for roughly 15 years. During that time, I met and married my husband in Los Alamos, and we have raised our family here. I have two children still at home: a soon to be junior at Los Alamos High School and a soon to be 8th grader at Los Alamos Middle School. I am also the mother of twin 24-year-olds. My father is retired career military and a former small business owner in Glendale, AZ. Working remotely from Los Alamos, I provided web development, graphics design, marketing, and analytics support for his business. At the present time, I do not hold a position of paid employment, and therefore have the necessary time to devote to the councilor position.

Qualifications:

My chief qualification is my past public service in Los Alamos. I have served one term each on the Los Alamos Board of Education and the County's Planning & Zoning Commission, including holding the presidency / chair positions for both of those bodies. I have also served as a board member for the LANL Foundation during its formative years and for Little Forest Playschool (including board president). As an engaged community volunteer, I have assisted regularly and frequently in the schools, coached youth sports teams, and volunteered for many various community organizations, events and initiatives over the last 20 years. My most recent service includes one year volunteering extensively with the Los Alamos Community Foundation and one year creating and nurturing Interfaith Los Alamos. Interfaith Los Alamos is a community-wide interfaith initiative enabling our community's many churches and congregations to work together across lines of faith to provide significant, coordinated assistance when need situations arise that are too big for any one individual or group to handle alone. To date, the primary focus has been helping refugees rebuild new lives after being recently resettled in Albuquerque.

As a result of my past public service as an elected and appointed official in our community, I have received extensive training on the role of a board (and commission) member. Such training is directly applicable to County Council service. I have valuable experience working cooperatively on policy-making bodies: I know how to make decisions and move forward when there is a diverse range of opinions, and in some cases intense controversy, involved. While a school board member, I helped preserve the Schools' annual \$8 million federal budget appropriation, pass school bond elections, and negotiate the

teachers' union contract. I was instrumental in the redevelopment of the property on which the current Smith's Marketplace now stands. While serving on Planning and Zoning Commission, I was heavily involved with the work to substantially update a former version of the County's Comprehensive Plan. I also served on the Variance Board (now Board of Adjustment). I am familiar with the Open Meetings Act, as well as Robert's Rules of Order and how Council meetings are conducted. I understand the importance of citizen input. I also understand the role of County staff.

This experience and background will allow me to step into the vacancy ready to serve. I may not currently know all of the details about the many activities in which Council is now engaged, but I am a quick study and I have the time to devote to the process. I pledge to be at meetings on time, having read the prepared materials, and ready to participate in a positive manner.

Politics:

My current political affiliation is "Decline to State" (DTS). For many years I was registered as a Republican, but it was my experience that party affiliation had little or nothing to do with service on School Board or Planning & Zoning Commission. I believe in examining the issues and basing decisions on the best information available at the time, rather than being tied to any perceived political party platforms or stances. I recognize that a diversity of backgrounds and experiences is necessary on our governing bodies in order to achieve policy decisions that best support an entire community. If pressed to state my tendencies, I would say that I am a fiscal conservative who leans Republican. Much more importantly, I have no axe to grind and am not seeking this vacancy in order to push a personal agenda.

Motivations:

In closing, I am interested in this opportunity because I actually enjoy community service. Serving in public office is not always easy: there can be strong opinions, strong emotions, and strong personalities associated with the issues we face and the decisions that must be made. Nevertheless, I have found it rewarding to work together with others who feel similarly about public service and who are committed to engaging in the very processes used to ensure a vibrant community for all of our citizens and visitors.

Thank you for considering my qualifications. If I am selected to fill the vacancy, I look forward to this opportunity to serve.

Emergency Management Guide for Elected Officials

This guide will serve as a tool to help prepare for, respond to and recover from emergencies of varying kinds. The goal of this guide is to help you understand and effectively manage and execute your role as an elected official of Los Alamos County during a disaster. From notification of the initial emergency situation to calls from the media, you will know what to do and how to accomplish keeping citizen's calm and informed. Once calls offering assistance begin you will know how to manage and organize entities including other governmental organizations, volunteers and donations.

The role of the elected official in the community is to lead. Assisting in disaster planning and preparedness aids the community by having responsibilities already clearly defined and trusted relationships built. Use this guide to help facilitate your planning and preparedness to ensure that response and recovery can be more efficient and successful.

How well a community recovers from a disaster largely depends on the steps taken before a disaster occurs. Emergency management revolves around five principles:

- Planning Having plans in place for different elements (evacuation, sheltering) to maintain efficiency during a disaster.
- Preparedness A continuous cycle of organizing, training, equipping, exercising, evaluation and improvement activities to ensure effective coordination and capabilities.
- Mitigation Attempts to prevent hazards from developing into disasters, or to reduce the effects of disasters when they occur. Mitigation occurs throughout the five principles.
- Response This is the mobilization of resources once a disaster occurs. First responders (fire and police) are usually first on-scene and will ask for additional resources.
- Recovery The aim of the recovery phase is to restore the affected area to as near its previous state as possible. A goal of recovery should be to implement proper mitigation measures to avoid future problems.

These principles guide the decisions we make and how we operate. You can see most of the principles involve being proactive well before an emergency happens. Elected officials should consider having these principles play a role in how they lead and make decisions for our community.

Once a disaster occurs there are priorities, keep these in mind during an emergency:

- **1.** Life Safety
- 2. Incident Stabilization
- **3.** Conservation of property and the environment

Elected Officials Role

All disasters occur at the local level first. It is the local elected official's duty to provide leadership and policy guidance to their jurisdiction before, during and after a disaster. Local elected officials should engage in preparedness efforts, which are constantly ongoing and involve activities to prepare for disasters and emergencies, as well as aid in future response and recovery efforts.

The following sections will outline some roles and responsibilities of elected officials before, during and after a disaster:

Before a Disaster:

- Make planning and preparing for disasters a priority at all levels of your organization
- Meet with your emergency management team to learn about what hazards threaten this community and how they are being addressed
- Learn about emergency management and disaster assistance programs at the federal and state level before they are needed
- Provide policy direction for prevention/protection-related, response, recovery and mitigation-related activities
- Encourage all departments and businesses within your jurisdiction to coordinate and collaborate with your emergency management team
- Familiarize yourself with the Emergency Operations Plans (EOP) and visit the Emergency Operation Center (EOC). The EOP for the county is a very detailed guide to emergencies.
- Encourage the people in your community to develop an emergency plan and be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours during the immediate aftermath of a disaster
- Obtain the necessary training to be an efficient and effective leader during an emergency. The National Incident Management System (NIMS) provides a strong base of basic knowledge
- Participate in disaster and emergency drills and full-scale exercises
- Learn about the damage assessment process and how it can impact obtaining federal assistance
- Learn your legal authorities, responsibilities and duties (see Authorities and References Annex)

During a Disaster:

- Support and work with your emergency management officials, as needed. This may include authorizing a local state of emergency, and issuing emergency orders
- Communicate quickly, clearly and effectively to your constituents and work with your partners to ensure a coordinated message
- Get accurate information out early and often, ensure that your message is accessible to all
- Work with the Public Information Officer (PIO) to ensure a unified message
- Refrain from letting political interests guide decision making
- Maintain situational awareness regarding the disaster by staying informed
- Trust and empower your County Manager, public safety and emergency management officials to make the right decisions
- DOCUMENT EVERYTHING!

After a Disaster:

- Understand how to obtain disaster assistance following a disaster and understand the limitations of it (see Disaster/Emergency Declaration Annex)
- Support your community throughout the recovery process. Recovery can take months or years to complete
- Help identify opportunities to build back better and mitigate future damage through mitigation planning and smart infrastructure investments
- Ask questions the recovery and process programs can be complex
- Attend briefings by department heads and community meetings

Elected officials make decisions that should ensure the safety of their constituents, visitors, economies, environment and communities.

Information

Elected officials should be aware of all potential hazards within the community they serve. Following is a chart of hazards faced by this community, the significance, cascading events and primary impacts for Los Alamos County:

- Cyber-Attacks
- Severe weather emergencies including extreme straight line winds, tornados, and snow load
- Structural fires, explosions, etc.
- Wildland Fires

Los Alamos County utilizes multiple sources to disseminate information. When an emergency occurs notification will happen in the following manner:

- 1. The Consolidated Dispatch Center notifies the Chain of Command
- 2. Los Alamos County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) notifies the Situation Assessment Team (SAT), which includes the County Manager, Police Chief, Fire Chief, Utilities Manager and the Public Works Director.
- **3.** SAT verifies the information and notifies the county PIO, Los Alamos National Labs (LANL) and the County Council
- **4.** The Emergency Operation Center is activated, or partially activated (situation dependent), at the Los Alamos Police Department or LANL

- **5.** The Los Alamos County Joint Information Center (JIC) is established at either Bradbury Museum or the library
- **6.** Los Alamos Customer Care will assist with non-emergency phone calls

Los Alamos County utilizes the following systems for communication:

- CodeRED Mobile Alert System This system can be used to inform the general public of an
 ongoing situation and what steps to take during. The CodeRED application can also message
 specific groups (senior management, command staff) to alert them of the situation and notify
 them about where to report. Please download the CodeRED app from any of the major app
 stores and provide your contact information to the Office of Emergency Management
- AM1610 radio station for local alerts and information during a disaster or emergency situation
- Los Alamos County's website www.losalamosnm.us keeps updated information on the main page
- Los Alamos County also utilizes social media and the information is maintained through the county's Public Information Officer
- Know your local points of contact (POC) and keep their information available (See Contacts Annex)

Applying for Public Assistance

Assistance from the federal government is coordinated through the county emergency manager. Following a disaster the emergency manager will request a preliminary damage assessment for the county. This information will be added to the state request for federal disaster assistance. If a declaration is made, the emergency manager will contact you and provide a meeting date for a conference on how to make an application for funding. More information can be obtained through FEMA http://www.fema.gov/news/disasters.fema. Also, the FEMA Public Assistance Policy Digest is available upon request from FEMA and is a good reference.

Public assistance must meet established thresholds for federal disaster assistance. There are also different categories of work.

- Category A: Debris removal. Clearance of debris on public lands or waters.
- Category B: Emergency protective measures. Measures to preserve life and property.
- Category C: Roads and Bridges. Repair or replacement of roads, streets and bridges.
- Category D: Water Control Facilities. Repair or replacement of dikes, levees, irrigation works and drainage facilities.
- Category E: Buildings and Equipment. Repair or replacement of public buildings and related equipment, including repairs and operating assistance to public elementary and secondary schools by the Department of Education.
- Category F: Utilities. Repair or replacement of public utilities.
- Category G: Parks and recreational facilities.

FEMA sets annual dollar thresholds of uninsured eligible damage to public facilities and certain private nonprofit organizations, based on population. The FEMA statewide threshold and county thresholds must BOTH be met in order for the Governor to request a presidential disaster declaration.

The FY16 amount for Los Alamos County is: \$64,082

The FY16 amount statewide is: \$2,903,442

Individual assistance to residence provides no specific thresholds, but federal regulations provide averages that are used by FEMA as guidelines. For New Mexico the averages are 173 homes with major damage or destroyed, resulting in approximately \$2.8 million in UNISURED housing assistance.

Documentation is a critical part aspect during an emergency or disaster. The county's ability to seek disaster funding depends on good documentation and should be near the top of your priority list as an elected official. To be successful in the funding request the county must be able to document every aspect of the emergency. Staffing (even volunteers), equipment, consumables, equipment rental, sheltering, etc. can all qualify for reimbursement at a certain percentage of the overall cost. The documentation must detail ALL efforts for response and recovery. In some cases it should document the need for future allocation of mitigation funds.

Another important aspect to qualify for public assistance is complying with the preparation and training requirements as described by FEMA and must be structured in accordance with the NIMS guidelines. Failure to do so could result in the county being denied part or all of the funding assistance that we would otherwise qualify for.

ATTACHMENT B

AUTHORITIES AND REFERENCES

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF COUNTY COUNCIL

- Will vary based on the type of disaster/event and duration
- Work closely with County Manager to protect citizens, local businesses and response organizations
- Role is the Subject Matter Expert of County regarding Continuity of Government
- Authorize Disaster Declaration may require emergency council meeting
- Hold public meetings to conduct business relevant to response and recovery (i.e., the adoption of ordinances)
- Review potential or threatened litigation and provide guidance
- Host and accompany VIPs and government officials

EMERGENCY PROCLAMATION

- Legal method which authorizes extraordinary measures to meet an emergency
- Rational threefold:
 - To acknowledge local disaster and responded to the best of ability-first step to federal and state disaster relief programs
 - To alert NM Department Homeland Security and State of NM that resources have been fully utilized and County may request assistance
 - To empower local officials to take extraordinary measures while affording safeguards against legal liability
- Written or verbal, verbal must be followed by a written filed with NMDHSEM and filed with County Clerk's office

DISASTER DECLARATION

- Issued when, in the judgment of the County Council, the threat or actual occurrence of an emergency is of sufficient severity and magnitude that local resources are insufficient
- The County can declare a State of Local Emergency for seven (7)days, then it must be renewed or terminated.
- Effective for up to 90 days when executed by the Governor

INCIDENT COMMAND

- In an emergency the roles do not change for County Council
 - Response to emergencies fall under Police Chief/Fire Chief/County
 Manager (appoint Incident Commander)
 - Do not respond to the site unless cleared to do so
 - If media requests tour, coordinate with Incident Commander
- Incident Commander's priorities are:
 - #I Life Safety
 - #2 Incident Stabilizations
 - #3 Property/Environmental Conservation

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER

- Central location of authority and information (LANL/LAPD)
 - Manage and coordinate emergency operations
 - Receive and disseminate information
 - Develop emergency policies, procedures and action plans
 - Control and coordinate operational and logistic support
 - Maintain contact and coordination with support agencies
- Coordinate and manage Incident Commander's priorities

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER

- LAC OEM notifies Situation Assessment Team (SAT) which includes County Manager, Chief of Police, Fire Chief, Utilities Manager and PW Director to stand up EOC
- Council reports to Council Chambers or alternate facility (as directed by CodeRed or phone/email reporting instructions)
- EOC activated; full, partial or virtual
 - Levels of activation and staffing determined by event
 - Operational periods determined by emergency (12, 18, 24 etc)
 - Multiple situational briefings will occur (determined by SAT/OEM)
- Council rep may be requested to respond to the EOC as a liaison

PUBLIC INFORMATION

- Council will be contacted and briefed by the County Manager
- Media briefings may be scheduled for Council to attend
- Council will be briefed on response and recovery actions
- Council will be provided copies of all news releases and information
- Council members will be sought out by media for comments or information
 - Coordinate messages with PIO/County Manager/SAT
 - Let PIO know you spoke with the media and what was said

COUNCIL ROLE AFTER THE DISASTER

- Support recovery operations to include repopulation
- Address short term and long term needs of the community
- Tour damaged areas and meet with impacted residents
- Develop and implement mitigation measure in county's land use planning and management (comprehensive plans, zoning regulations)
- Address recovery needs across all sectors of the economy and community
- Assess needs for special resolutions, permits, and construction moratoria
- Identify outside investment and aid for public facilities and private investment
