

6. OLD BUSINESS

Diamond Drive Project and Trinity Drive/NM502
 Improvements

 Eric Martinez, County Engineer provided an update regarding the Diamond Drive Project and the Trinity Drive/NM502 Improvements.

Diamond Drive - Award of the contract to Star Paving was approved by County Council on Tuesday, July 9, 2019. A pre-construction meeting will be held the week of July 15 and the project will start on or around July 22. The project consists of a 2- inch mill and overlay from the Omega Bridge to the roundabout at San Ildefonso. The first project segment from Omega Bridge to Sandia Drive is scheduled for completion by August 14, prior to the start of school with the full project to be completed by September 27. The overall an overall budget is \$4,475,000 with a state grant pending.

Trinity Drive/NM502 Improvements - Mr. Martinez attended the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting on Wednesday, July 10, 2019 regarding Site Plan Approval for the Hill Apartments, a 149-unit multi-family rental apartment complex. The commission discussed Site Plan and the require criteria as found in the County's development code. The property is located on the south side of 35th Street approximately 200 feet south of Trinity Drive. The commission voted to approve the site plan with an added condition to provide a plan for safe ingress and egress in coordination with NMDOT prior to construction. Three waivers were also approved by the commission.

Mr. Martinez and Ms. Desirae Lujan, Senior Engineer, attended a meeting at NMDOT on Thursday, July 11, 2019 to discuss the traffic analysis for the apartment complex. NMDOT is reviewing the traffic analysis for the Road Diet and County staff will continue to work on addressing comments and questions from NMDOT. Monthly updates will be provided to the Board.

Mr. Martinez provided a brief update of the NM 502 roundabout project. Member Barretta asked if the Driving Roundabouts Flyer that NMDOT printed could be included in the utility bill or handed out at booths or events around town.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

Purpose

The County seeks a qualified and experienced Consultant to provide a Comprehensive Transit Study and an Updated Five Year Service Plan for the County's public transit system, Atomic City Transit ("ACT"). The study and updated plan will include all of the items discussed in the Scope of Work and Deliverables section below. The final plan will prioritize recommended changes to ACT's transit service, including recommended modifications to existing service, as well as any proposed new service, specifically optimal weekend services. The plan will also include recommended modifications or changes to current practices to provide more reliable and efficient operations and organizational approaches that contribute to overall effectiveness of transit management.

Background

Service Area

ACT provides service to the communities of White Rock and Los Alamos in the County, which is located approximately 35 miles northwest of Santa Fe and 65 miles southwest of Taos. The population of the county is 17,950 (2010 US Census Estimate) which grows by approximately 6,500 (Los Alamos National Laboratory Community Impact Data Profile 2017) people a day during the work week due to the workforce that comes into Los Alamos.

Routes

ACT currently operates eight fixed routes and five afternoon express routes from 6:00 am to 7:00 pm Monday through Friday. A seasonal (mid-May to mid-October) route provides service to Bandelier National Monument seven days a week. ACT also operates a paratransit service same hours as the fixed route with origin to destination service and door to door when needed and requested. Dial-A-Ride service is offered to the general public with ADA accessible vehicles from 6:30 pm to 9:00 pm Monday through Friday.

Schedule:

- Hourly service on six neighborhood routes (Main Hill to/from White Rock, Truck Route to/from White Rock, Canyon/Central, North Community, Barranca Mesa and North Mesa) between 6:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.
- Twice an hour service on one neighborhood route (North Mesa) during peak periods.
- Service every 30 minutes on three routes (Downtown Circulator, North Community and Canyon/Central) between 6:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.
- Service every 15 minutes on the Downtown Circulator during peak periods.
- ADA Complementary Paratransit Service for individuals with disabilities during the same days and hours of the fixed route service.
- Dial-a-Ride service for the general public between 6:30 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.
- Seasonal service between White Rock and Bandelier National Monument 7 days per week from approximately 9:00 a.m. to 5:10 p.m. Frequency is every 30 minutes on weekdays and 20 minutes on weekends.

 Afternoon Express service operates only on school days and is open to the general public. In addition to scheduled drop off locations, Afternoon Express buses drop riders off at other marked bus stops along each of the routes, with the exception of bus stops located on Trinity Drive.

Employees

ACT currently has 38.58 employees, six of which are Limited Term Employees (FTEs) hired to operate the Bandelier National Monument service. Two Limited Term Employees (FTEs) are retained throughout the year to provide additional support to the fixed route service.

Ridership

Atomic City Transit was established in 2007 and seen a healthy ridership given the current 2010 population census.

Existing Five Year Transit Service Plan

The existing Five Year Transit Service Plan changed the design of operation to a thirty minute pulse system which was approved by County Council on March 31, 2015. This service plan has been used as a guide the past few years, although adjustments in the implementation schedule have been made based on the needs in the community, available funding, and direction provided by the County Council and County management.

Funding

Los Alamos County will use Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5304 State Planning Funds to fund a portion of a Comprehensive Transit Study and complete an updated Five Year Transit Service Plan for the County's Atomic City Transit public transit system. Therefore, applicable Federal regulations will apply. Proposed must review and certify that they have read and understand all contract clauses, attachments and certifications. The consultant will perform the work in compliance with FTA, State and County procurement code. The breakout of funding is as follows:

Federal Share (5304 funds) \$50,000 Local Share (Transit fund) \$12,500 **Total Budget:** \$62,500

Intelligent Transportation System (ITS)

ACT has been utilizing Avail ITS system which include Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL), Mobile Data Terminals (MDTs), Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD), Global Positional System (GPS), and Real Time Passenger information by hosted website, text messaging and smart phone application, automatic vehicle annunciators (AVA), next bus technologies and paratransit scheduling software.

GENERAL TIMELINE, SCOPE OF WORK AND DELIVERABLES

The General Timeline shown below identifies major milestones for the project and the estimated timeframes. The schedule below is tentative and subject to revision. Once the project is awarded, the Contractor shall prepare a detailed project schedule. The Scope of Work and Deliverables for the Comprehensive Transit Study and updated Five Year Transit Service Plan is as follows:

[DATE] - Consultant conducts Project Start-Up, including at least the following items:

- 1. Consultant develops a Draft Detailed Work Plan/Schedule within 2 weeks of contract signing, including an initial summary of tasks identified. The work plan will include a project schedule; describe the procedures, methods, and standards to be used in conducting the Transit Study and developing a Five Year Transit Service Plan, and a description of the format of the final product. This preliminary work plan will be reviewed by ACT Project Manager in the 2 weeks preceding the work plan presentation meeting.
- 2. Consultant to hold an on-site full-day Draft Detailed Work Plan/Schedule Review meeting with ACT management within one month of the contract start date. Following the meeting, the Consultant shall incorporate all ACT comments and prepare the Final Detailed Work Plan/Schedule.
- Consultant to provide a Final Detailed Work Plan/Schedule for approval by ACT Project Manager, with milestones and costs associated with each task no later than 1 week after the Work Plan/Schedule Review Meeting.

[DATE] – Consultant Conducts Comprehensive Transit Study and develops Draft Five Year Transit Service Plan and Attachments, including at least the following items:

- 1. Review the existing Atomic City Transit Service Plan and determine ACT's current status with respect to the existing plan.
- 2. Identify transit demand through existing data and solicitation of community input, including public meetings in Los Alamos and White Rock.
- 3. Conduct on-board rider surveys
- 4. Interview and obtain system input from Transit Manager, Supervisors, Lead Operators, Dispatchers and Transit Operators, Fleet Manager, Fleet Supervisors and Fleet Mechanics.
- 5. Conduct analysis and evaluation of the existing service/routes in terms of improving efficiencies and meeting community demand. Review routes and connections, as well as schedules.
- 6. Research and recommend coordination with the existing regional connectors to Espanola, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, and Taos, including connections via NCRTD, Park and Ride, and Rail Runner and Los Alamos National Lab L.A. Taxi Service
- 7. Recommend and prioritize options for changes/improvements to the existing service/routes that will improve efficiencies and safety and meet community demand.
- 8. Research and recommend the possible weekend service for Los Alamos and White Rock to support local and visitor travel and cost analysis for implementation.
- 9. Prepare a Draft Transit Study Results Report and Draft Five Year Transit Service Plan with an Executive Summary, include scalable scenario options based on various service levels and available funding.
- 10. Develop and include a corresponding Draft Financial Plan for Operating and Capital Costs, with funding source breakout for each of the possible service and funding scenario in the Draft Five Year Transit Service Plan.
- 11. Evaluate staffing requirements for various service and funding scenarios proposed in the Draft Five Year Transit Plan.
- 12. Evaluate the existing driver schedules in order to identify potential efficiencies and/or deficiencies with the regards to the commendations made in the Draft Five Year Transit Service Plan.
- 13. Evaluate the existing fleet (including number and size of vehicles) and develop Draft Purchase and Replacement Schedules corresponding the difference service and funding scenarios proposed in the Draft Five Year Transit Service Plan.
- 14. Evaluate the existing fleet (including fuel source and maintenance process) in order to promote electric vehicle use within the existing or proposed route structure. Develop a draft Service and Cost Analysis Report using Electric Source Fuel Vehicles and provide existing or proposed routes that could use the Electric powered vehicles.



Transportation Board Recruiting One New Member

The Transportation Board meets the first Thursday of the month at 5:30 p.m. Meetings are held at 1000 Central Avenue, Room #110.

July 11, 2019 Transportation Board Meeting Highlights

Eric Martinez, County Engineer, provided an update on Public Works Projects.

Airport Division

Mowing Operations



Tall vegetation on an airfield attracts wildlife that can be hazardous to aircraft operations. The USDA noted in its February 2017, Wildlife Damage Management Technical Series, "Collisions between aircraft and wildlife (wildlife strikes) are common occurrences. Wildlife strikes are not only numerous, but also costly. Estimates suggest that wildlife strikes cost the civil aviation industry in the U.S. up to \$625 million annually, and nearly 500 people have been killed in wildlife strikes worldwide. Most wildlife strikes occur in the airport environment: 72 percent of all strikes occur when the aircraft is 500 ft or less above ground level, and 41 percent of strikes occur when the aircraft is on the

ground during landing or takeoff. Thus, management efforts to reduce wildlife hazards are focused at the airport." The most effective technique for reducing wildlife hazards at airports is reducing/controlling attractants. Therefore, in an effort to mitigate wildlife hazards, Traffic & Streets and Airport staff conduct frequent mowing operations on the airfield throughout the growing season.

Custodial Division

- The Custodial Division supported 246 events during the month of July.
- The old wooden picnic tables were replaced with metal picnic tables at Fuller Lodge.
- The carpets were cleaned at Fuller Lodge and various suites at the Municipal Building.
- Carpet cleaning is scheduled in August for Mesa Public Library and the Nature Center.

Engineering & Project Management Division

Diamond Drive Pavement Rehabilitation Project



Diamond Drive will be milled and inlayed from the Omega Bridge through the Roundabout at San Ildefonso this summer. Work began on July 22nd. Work between Omega Bridge and Sandia/Orange St. intersection is slated to be complete prior to school beginning on August 15th, per the contract. Project completion is scheduled for late September of this year.

Canyon Rim Trail Phase 3 The County has been working with the consultant to acquire parcels with

private owners. Formal offers are being drafted and coordinated by the County Attorney's office.

NM 502 Reconstruction, Knecht St. to Tewa Loop

Staff continues to coordinate with NMDOT on this state lead project. The contractor, Star Paving, began work on March 18, 2019. Agency coordination is ongoing for projects occurring on or near DP Road for public outreach. Trinity is currently detoured through Central Avenue at Knecht, and traffic east of Central was shifted to the north for utility and storm drain installation on the south side of Trinity Drive between Tewa Loop and DP Road. This detour is expected to remain in place through most of the summer months.

Canyon Rim Trail Underpass

The project was awarded federal FY2018 funding under the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) for project study and design in the amount of \$320,000 and FY2020 TAP funding for project construction in the amount of \$2,020,000 for a total award of \$2,340,000.

A trail plat of easement, as requested by NMDOT, was reviewed by NMDOT and comments received for revisions. A final submittal is forthcoming to NMDOT. Final plans are anticipated following the approval of the plat by NMDOT and recent of NMDOT certifications. Construction is anticipated to begin in March 2020.

Tracts A-13/A-12 LASO Offsite Improvements Project

Santa Fe Engineering, the County's design consultant, presented the design alternatives to the Transportation Board on January 3rd. The board requested a road diet be considered on Trinity Drive between Oppenheimer and Diamond Drive. The road diet scope was added and analyzed by SFE. The findings and a preferred alignment, based on the model's analysis,

were presented and a recommendation to move forward with the Road Diet alternative from Diamond Drive to Oppenheimer Drive was made by the T-Board at the May 2, 2019 meeting. Following the meeting the traffic analysis was completed and was submitted to NMDOT for their review and approval, as Trinity Dr. is a State facility. The recommended alternative was presented to County Council on June 25th and comments were received to refer to NMDOT for their review. If NMDOT concurs with the recommended alternative, final design will begin and is anticipated to be complete in 2019.

SR4 and Truck Route

NM 4/East Jemez Rd. (Truck Route) Intersection: Staff continues to work with DOE, NMDOT Bandelier, and Army Corps of Engineers to program, design and construct intersection upgrades to improve capacity and safety. Bohannon Huston completed a traffic study documenting a preliminary estimate for the preferred alignment estimated at \$4.3Million including NMGRT.

USACE and DOE are currently under design with Bohannon Huston and final designs are anticipated late August of 2019. Bi-weekly project team meetings are being held with all stakeholders to keep this project on schedule. A 90% design review was held on July 17 with an updated estimate of \$4.3Million, not including USACE overhead.

DOE evaluated the remaining SEP funds available and have approximately \$3Million for this project. Public Works staff received a call for projects from the NMDOT for State funds with a 5% required match. A grant application was submitted requesting additional funding for this project, however it was not funded. NMDOT expressed interest in obtaining budget at the 90% review meeting for the construction of this project.

Aquatic & Airport Re-roof – FBT Architects

A task order to FBT Architects was issued and design should be completed in early July. Work would begin in September.

Staff received the 100% Construction Documents and they are being reviewed. They will go to bid either Aug 4 or 11, with award being around Sep 3. Work will begin in October.

On Call Construction Services

An RFP is being developed to provide on-call facility work as needed for smaller projects that are small in scale to go out to bid individually or that need to be fast-tracked. Remodels, smaller mechanical, electrical and plumbing jobs would fall into this category, generally less than \$200,000 each, many being \$50,000 or less.

Fire Station 6 Restroom Remodels – Riskin and Associates (Design)

The restrooms at Fire Station 6 (Airport) will be refurbished as it has been a little over 10 years since they were last re-done and are looking worn.

Project is out for advertising and bids are scheduled to be received Aug 1, with a Construction start of around Sep 3. Work would continue until early December with a Final Completion at the end of January 2020.

Ice Rink Improvements

An RFP for design was advertised and proposal received. With the change-over of Fiscal years and with Procurement being heavily involved in that process, the award of the RFP has slipped a little. We are now hoping to award and notify the Design Team at the end of July. This should not affect the overall design completion of the end of 2019. Design will continue thru the end of 2019, advertised after the holidays, with construction running from about March 1 thru October, with final completion slated for the end of the year (punch list, close-out documentation). A meeting with the Parks and Recreation Board will occur in the Fall (last month inadvertently said "Spring") once the "30%" drawings are reviewed by staff.

Fire Station 3 Alternate Dispatch Area

Plans to provide a secondary dispatch area at Fire Station 3 began two years ago to eliminate the need for an alternate dispatch location to reside at the Santa Fe Dispatch area. Planning and Design work to complete the infrastructure is needed before 911 lines are installed. This work is not yet scheduled.

Kiddie Pool Project

A project kick-off meeting was held with the Architect and staff on June 10th. Preliminary concepts were presented in a follow up meeting on June 24th. Public meetings are being planned for the August/September time frame.

Piñon Park Splash Pad

A kick off meeting was held on June 6th 2019. Preliminary siting discussions have been held with staff and a site visit was had in preparation for presentation of a recommendation on siting and thematic design which is in the works with results expected before the August 8th Parks and Rec. Board meeting.

Golf Course Irrigation Project

A kick off meeting was held on June 13th 2019. The engineering consulting has begun preparing a site layout map by aerial drone of the course for piping and sprinkler head lay out. A best solution/system will be presented at the Parks and Rec. Board meeting on or before August 8, 2019.

Public Health Office Remodel

This project makes some minor remodel work to the Public Health Office for a new health care provider to operate in the space. Only one quote was received from contractors and it was over the \$35k limit requiring advertising for bidders. A Facilities crew started on July 18th and plans to be complete by August 1st.

White Rock Senior Meals Center Kitchen Equipment Upgrade

Work started in the kitchen on March 16th and was completed on March 25th. Senior are be served through the Los Alamos Senior Center Kitchen during this period. The White Rock Kitchen will reopen on April 1st.

Environmental Services Division

Los Alamos County Landfill Gas (LFG) Update

With the installation of the Landfill Gas Control and Collection system, the methane levels have decreased and are in compliance with New Mexico Environment Department (NMED) Solid Waste Rules. Environmental Services has received approval from NMED to reduce monitoring from weekly to guarterly as prescribed by NMAC Solid Waste Rules.



5 Years with Los Alamos County



Environmental Services Manager Angelica Gurule, Senior Office Specialist Joshua Levings and Office Specialist Sara Thurgood celebrated five years with Los Alamos County and received their five-year certificates and recognition pins.

Water Bottle Filling Station at the Eco Station



Environmental Services staff recently installed a new water bottle filling station at the Eco Station. In just the first week the station has helped reduce the use of disposable water bottles by 60 bottles. Two more of these stations are scheduled to be installed at the Municipal Building at a later date. Providing water bottle filling stations helps reduce single-use plastic water bottles.

Y Corp - Upcycled Glass Gabion Basket Project & Tour of the Eco Station



Y Corp students from the YMCA Los Alamos continue to gain work experience in a field setting at the closed Los Alamos landfill. The students built gabion baskets and filled them with glass bottles as a means to reduce erosion and stabilize the landfill slopes. The group also took a tour of the Eco Station facility and learned about transfer station operations, what is accepted and how to be better recyclers, and what happens to the recyclables and waste after it is brought to the transfer station.

Outreach and Education at Science Fest

Environmental Services staff and Environmental Sustainability Board members Amanda MacDonald, Heather Ward and Sue Barns hosted a booth at Science Fest Discovery Day. The focus of the day was to educate residents and receive input on the Save As You Throw program as well as education on food waste reduction.






Los Alamos Summer Concert Series – Zero Waste Stations



The Environmental Sustainability Board members, Zero Waste Team members, and **Environmental Services** staff are aiming to make Friday night concerts zero waste. Zero waste means sending little to nothing to the landfill or creating no waste. During the concerts attendees are able to ask recycle questions and some are thankful the County is providing this service. On average, curbside pickup in Los Alamos diverts 25% of waste through recycle and yard trimming diversion. At

the summer concerts with the help of volunteers and workers we are able to divert an average of 50% of waste, through food composting and recycle.


