County Manager's Monthly Update

LOS ALAMOS COUNTY JUNE - 2017

CMO

Senator Martin Heinrich was in Los Alamos on May 27, 2017. Senator Heinrich was in town to make two special announcements concerning the Manhattan Project National Historical Park. He was joined by MPNHP Superintendent Kris Kirby at an event held at the MAPR Visitor Center. He announced the formation of a Los Alamos Friends of the Manhattan Project NHP. This organization, led by former Councilor Kristin Henderson, received a letter of intent from Superintendent Kirby. The board of the new organization was introduced at this ceremony. Superintendent Kirby presented the Los Alamos Historical Society with a check for \$10,000 (photos from the event are shown below). The Historical Society in partnership with Los Alamos County was recently awarded a Park Service Heritage Partnership grant to complete an interpretation plan for Fuller Lodge.





Los Alamos County is embarking on the development of a new wayfinding program that will direct visitors and residents to various attractions and amenities around town. Wayfinding encompass a variety of tools that help guide people to their destination, this includes signage, maps and digital tools. Wayfinding programs also help to establish an identity and reinforce a sense of place. Regions, cities, towns and communities of all sizes are establishing wayfinding programs to provide a better experience for their visitors. The County has hired MERJE, a nationally recognized wayfinding expert, to guide the community through this process. MERJE visited Los Alamos in March and will be presenting their Wayfinding Analysis and Schematic Design Concepts on June 15th. They will be reconvening the various Stakeholder groups, so that they may provide comments to the work accomplished to date. There will also be a **Public Meeting at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 15th in Council Chambers** (in the Municipal Building) to give the community an overview of wayfinding and opportunity to provide feedback on the Schematic Design concepts

COMMMUNICATIONS & PUBLIC RELATIONS DIVISION

The PIO wrapped up outreach on the recreation bond election (May 23) and now is working on other seasonal outreach that increases during summer months as well as ramping up support/outreach for the Tourism Plan, Wayfinding Plan and implementation of the Brand Action Plan (CPR will participate in the production of materials as directed/in collaboration with the Branding consultants). The Visual Information Specialists (VIS) are wrapping up the new trail maps and just completed significant effort for items that were needed for CSD for 100 days of summer promotion and the DWI Planning Council's buzz bus promotion. The VIS are proofing the new Visitor's Guide set to be published in June, working on branding materials for promotions, plus an assortment of ads, forms and other materials requested by departments.

Contract renewals for FY18 are in progress along with yearend close out activities for CPR work orders and purchasing.

CPR staff is also part of planning efforts for Sciencefest (July) and the County Fair and Rodeo (August) and items related to their promotion are increasing VIS workload. VIS are also spending several days in the field each month, working to update the photo library and capture more video of various County facilities or events in anticipation of needs for the Tourism Plan and branding efforts. All staff in CPR have leave planned between June and July and workload/availability will be adjusted accordingly.

Administration Division

2017 Bond Projects:



The ballot question failed by 486 votes. There were 3,446 ballots for the bond and 3,932 ballots against it. A total of 7,383 ballots were returned to the County Clerk's Office of the more than 13,000 registered voters. Council Chambers was crowded on May 23 as adults and children awaited the results. The room emptied, mostly in silence, after County Clerk Naomi Maestas made the announcement.

Airport Division

State Aviation Conference:

David Ploeger was named Airport Manager of the Year.



At the 2017 Annual Meeting of the New Mexico Airport Managers Association (NMAMA) held in Ruidoso, May 10 -12, Los Alamos Manager, David Ploeger, was named New Mexico Airport Manager of the Year. This award goes to the airport manager that does an outstanding job in managing the airport and advancing aviation safety at his/her airport. Criteria includes administrative expertise, maintaining a safe and efficient airport, general upkeep of airport, staff and management interface (internal and external), and involvement in the local airport community.

The New Mexico Airport Managers Association Awards were first given out in

2000 at the Airport Managers Association Annual Conference and Trade Show. Prior to the conference, the NMDOT – Aviation Division and a member of the New Mexico Airport Managers Association discussed the nominees and winners in each category.

Nominees this year were Jim Talbert, Alamogordo White Sands Regional Airport, Mike Lewis, Farmington Four Corners Regional Airport, and David Ploeger, Los Alamos Airport.

Please join us in congratulating David Ploeger as 2017 Airport Manager of the year.

Fence Project:

Delta Airport Consultants has begun the design of the fence project and it is expected that the design will be completed later this summer. The FAA grant has been delayed due to the funding constraints placed on the FAA by the continuing resolution under which they had been funded. Congress has now passed another continuing resolution that funds the FAA through the end of FY 2017. The FAA has stated that we can expect to receive the grant later this fiscal year. Construction of the fence is presently scheduled to be funded by the FAA and State in FY 2018.

New Hangars:

The hangar manufacturer submitted a set of plans for the hangar which have been approved by the County building inspectors. The manufacturer has been informed of the approval and can now begin to fabricate the building. They have stated this process will take approximately 14 weeks to complete. The building materials should be delivered on site in either late August or early September. We expect the construction of the building to take approximately 30 days.

Custodial Division

The Custodial Division supported 238 events during the month of May.

The Division will begin transitioning over to a "Green" cleaning program beginning in June.

New tables were purchased for Fuller Lodge events and additional chairs were purchased for Council Chambers to accommodate overflow attendance.

Engineering & Project Management Division

Fire Station 3:

Architectural design work is nearing completion and includes a more substantial reroofing, as well as a new wall system, window replacement and HVAC system modifications to better insulate and control the temperature in the bunkrooms. It was stated last month that the project has been postponed until Fiscal Year 2020 due to funding reductions. However, staff has worked through the project list and reprioritized tasks so the project is now scheduled to be completed in FY2018. The plan is to have design work completed in May so that the project can advertised and be awarded in late July or early August.

Fire Station 4:

The Fire Station 4 HVAC replacement project consists of replacing the rooftop units with combination heating and AC units, replacing the existing boiler with a more efficient unit, removing floor tile and abating some asbestos mastic (glue). This project was awarded at the May 2nd County Council meeting to CAC, Inc. with a Notice to Proceed date of June 5. It is anticipated that construction will extend into October.

A second project at Fire Station 4, the shower replacement project is currently in progress, by contractor Allied 360. Crews have one shower unit 60% complete. In addition, new counter tops will also be installed in the shower areas. This work is anticipated to be completed in June.

Youth Activity Center Remodel:



Interior improvements have been completed at the Youth Activity Center. The project was completed at the end of April with the Youth Activity Center moving in on May 1. A re-opening celebration is being planned, date to be determined.



North Mesa Improvements Project Phase 1:



Construction began on May 1 with an anticipated completion date of August 10, 2017.

The Project consist of roadway improvements, which includes asphalt, paving, curb, gutter, sidewalks, ADA curb ramps, drive pads and drainage structures on Camino Uva (from San Ildefonso to the cul-desac) and Camino Durasnilla (from San Ildefonso to Camino Uva).



The Contractor is currently working on Camino Uva from the Cul-de-sac to Camino Cereza with curb & gutter, drive pads, sidewalk, and ADA curb ramps. The Contractor is scheduled to complete Camino Uva by July 1, the first milestone date.

20th Street Extension Project:

The project was advertised April 9, with a non-mandatory pre-bid meeting held on April 18. The bid opening was held for May 3, with award at the June 6, County Council Meeting. Construction is scheduled to begin in July with an anticipated completion of October 2017. The project will consist of roadway and utility improvements, which includes asphalt paving, curb, gutter, sidewalks, ADA curb ramps, drive pads and drainage structures. The utility improvements include gas, water, sanitary sewer and electrical distribution system improvements supplemental to the development of the 20th Street Extension corridor infrastructure.

Canyon Rim Trail Phase 3:

The County's consultant has begun work for easement acquisition and preliminary design services for the portion of trail between Knecht Street and 20th Street. A kickoff meeting was held on May 9 and survey work was started on May 18. The survey work was conducted using a drone, permission was granted by the FAA in conjunction with NNSA and LANL security. Further topographic land survey will be conducted at the site and drainage design work for potential alignments is underway.

Canyon Rim Trail Underpass:

In November 2016, an application was submitted to the NMDOT by way of the Regional Transportation Planning Organization for Transportation Arterial Program (TAP) funding for an underpass of the Canyon Rim Trail at the trailhead near Camino Entrada. On April 26, the NMDOT planning staff informed County staff that a decision was made to award Los Alamos County our entire request in the amount of \$2,340,000 (including the 14.56% local match). The funding is for federal fiscal year 2018 design funds and 2020 construction funds.

Bicycle Transportation Plan:



The Bicycle Transportation Plan Subcommittee has been meeting on a biweekly basis and continues to provide feedback as the Bicycle Transportation Plan takes shape. The subcommittee has suggested, as a public process, that presentations of the plan be made to the Planning & Zoning Commission, Parks & Recreation Board and the Transportation Board, these presentations have been given with positive feedback at each presentation. An electronic survey is currently on the County Open Forum web page to solicit feedback on the county's bicycling habits, this survey will close on May

8th. Public Works staff will present the plan to the Transportation Board at their June meeting for recommendation to County Council for approval. If recommendation is made, the subcommittee and staff intend to schedule the Plan for the County Council Work Session on June 13th and then the June 27th County Council meeting for approval.

Bike to Work Day:

The community ride planned for Friday, May 19 was cancelled due to inclement weather and will be rescheduled in the near future.

Future Projects...

- NM 4/East Jemez Rd. (Truck Route) Intersection: Staff continues to work with DOE, NMDOT, and Army Corps of Engineers to program, design and construct intersection upgrades to improve capacity and safety.
- NM 502 Reconstruction, Knecht St. to Tewa Loop: Staff continues to coordinate with NMDOT on this state lead project scheduled to begin this summer. NMDOT held a project bid letting on April 28, 2017, only one bid was submitted and unfortunately the bid was \$5 million over budget. NMDOT is doing a bid evaluation at this time.

Environmental Services Division



2017 Spring Quarterly Brush Collection Schedule

The Los Alamos County Council unanimously approved changes to the Brush Collection Program, which has resulted in brush being collected separately from bulk items. As part of the 2017 spring quarterly brush collection, Environmental Services has collected approximately 37.85 tons of brush.

Los Alamos County Landfill Gas Update:

This is a summary of results for April 2017 methane monitoring for the Los Alamos County closed landfill.



- 1. The LFG vents ranged in methane concentration from 38.2 (LFG Vent 7) to 60.8 (LFG Vent 2) percent gas in air.
- 2. The gas probe readings for the methane probes ranged in methane concentration from 1.0 (MP-12) to 38.7 (MP-8) percent gas in air.

3. The gas probe readings for the MP probes located at the landfill boundary ranged in methane concentration from 0.0 (MP-8R and MP-9R) to 7.8 (MP-10R) percent gas in air. In addition to MP-11R, MP-10R also exceeded the LEL.

4th Annual Clean Up Los Alamos Day:



Environmental Services would like to thank all the volunteers who participated in the 14th annual Clean Up Los Alamos Day on Saturday May 13th. It was a great success again this year with 339 participants collecting trash and brush around the Los Alamos and White Rock area. The county collected approximately 10.5 tons of solid waste and 156 residents utilized the Eco Station and Overlook Convenience Center Saturday for free disposal. The event wrapped up with an appreciation luncheon hosted at Ashley Pond, with hamburgers and hot dogs provided by David's Dogs. Environmental Services staff would like to thank LANB, Coca-Cola, and Los Alamos County who

sponsored the event.







LAFD Technical Rescue Team (TRT)

Los Alamos Technical Rescue Team assisted in surrounding Counties. On May 12th LAFD TRT was asked to assist the Taos EMS with rescuing two trapped kayakers in the area of Arroyo Hondo north of the Jon Dunbar bridge. LAFD responded Heavy Recue with their TRT members. LAFD crews met up with Taos EMS personnel in Taos and were escorted to the scene. Crews assessed the situation and developed a rescue plan. Crews built the rescue systems and were getting ready to initiate the operation when they received word that an airboat had reached the trapped kayakers. Heavy Rescue was put back in service on scene and returned to county.





On May 24th LAFD TRT was asked to assist Rio Arriba County emergency management with the rescue of and individual that had fallen and was stuck on a ledge at the echo amphitheater north of Abiquiu. LAFD responded Heavy Recue with their TRT members. Upon arrival LAFD made contact with the Rio Arriba County Fire Marshal. They were informed that the Espanola EMS was able to get to the individual off the cliff side, but that one of their members was still on the cliff side. After making contact with the individual it was decided the TRT members would hike to the top of the ridge, set up a rappel system, and effect a rescue for the EMS member. The crew was successful in fulfilling the rescue plan and getting all personnel off the cliff side. Heavy Rescue was put back in service on scene and returned to county.

Wildland Division

The LAFD Wildland Division has been working on insuring that all uniformed personnel of the LAFD have received their Red Card credentials. In order to receive a Red Card, personnel are required to complete certain training requirements which they receive during the academy. In addition personnel must complete a "Pack Test" this test consists of a 3 mile hike while carrying a 45lb pack. Red Card certification allow personnel to assist in a wildland fire anywhere in the state or country. The goal is to have all uniformed personnel Red Card certified. The first two employees of the LAFD to complete and obtain their Red Cards are FF David Baca and FF Patrick Thoma, who were the first team to be deployed by LAFD on May 4th, 2017 to assist with a controlled a burn in the Cuba Ranger district. The controlled burn was over 3,000 acres and was successful. This was a great milestone accomplished by the LAFD.

Push in Ceremony

On Thursday May 18th LAFD held a small ceremony at Fire Station 1 to recognize and celebrate the addition of six new fire apparatus to the LAFD fleet. The apparatus included the following...

- Engine 1 and Engine 6 these are front line pumpers that are capable of 1,500 gallons per minute.
- Heavy Rescue is used for response on larger incidents including structure fires, technical rescue, vehicle extrication. State of the art equipment needed for these types of incidents is readily available on Heavy Rescue.
- Light Rescue- is like Heavy Rescue in the sense that equipment is readily available to respond every day to minor vehicle accidents and EMS response.
- Type Four Wildland Engine- Is used for initial attack in Wildland Firefighting as well as structure protection. The Type Four has capacity to hold 800 gallons of water, and 25 gallons of Class-A Foam. The pump on the Type Four is capable of pumping approximately 250 gallons per minute.
- Type Five Wildland Engine- Is used for initial attack in Wildland firefighting. The Type 5 has the
 capacity to hold 400 gallons of water and 10 gallons of Class-A Foam. This apparatus can better
 navigate in rough terrain. The pump on the Type Five is capable to pump approximately 200 gallons
 per minute.

Knowledge Transfer Complete

A total of 40 eight hour sessions have been completed that included training and process analysis for Finance, Procurement, Human Resources, Payroll, Work Orders, Service Requests, Utility Billing and General Billing/Cashiering processes. Initial configuration and code decisions have been made and documented. The teams have been learning how County processes will need to change to meet the requirements of the new Munis system as well as streamline day to day activities as much as possible.

Static Environment Testing (SET) Begun

The finance and procurement teams have begun the next phase where a clean TEST environment is loaded with sample codes and configurations from documentation created in Knowledge Transfer and actual County data is used to test outcomes meet the requirements and expectations are correct. Adjustments will be made to setups based on these sessions.

Configuration of Production

Following approvals by the County of the Static Environment Test results, loading the Production environment with the hundreds of code tables, final configurations, work flows, roles and permissions will begin. It is expected that this phase will take approximately two months for all areas to complete.

Conversion

Concurrent with Production configuration the Information Management team will work with Tyler and the County business experts to perform final mapping of our legacy data that will convert into the new Munis system. Preparation tasks have been ongoing including data clean up and decisions about how much and which data we want to carry forward. Once mapping is complete, actual dry runs of converted data will begin being processed into Conversion environments for validation by County staff.

COMMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

Building Safety Division

The total number of commercial permits issued in May was 12, with a total valuation of \$327,000.

The total number of residential permits issued in May was 57, with a total valuation of \$623,872.

The Building Permit review turnaround time for all permits, including residential and commercial, was **1.57 days** in May.

Housing and Special Projects Division

Housing Rehabilitation Program (Home Renewal Program):

The 2016 program includes 11 rehabilitation projects, seven of which are for senior households. Work has been completed on five homes and is nearly completed on three more homes. It is anticipated that

the remaining projects will be completed by September 2017. A second round of applications of the program were received on May 31. A total of 15 applications were received and Los Alamos Housing Partnership staff will be reviewing them for eligibility in early June.

Homebuyer Assistance Program:

Negotiations are underway with a qualified external entity to implement the program. The contract for the program has been included on the June 27, 2017 Council agenda for consideration to approve. The program policies and procedures will be finalized and submitted to Council for their review in August. The program should be operational in August.

Planning Division

Planning & Zoning Commission Activities:

The Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) met on May 24th and approved the final plat for the 20th Street Subdivision. The 6-lot subdivision is a County-initiated economic development project.

The Board of Adjustment (BOA) had two cases scheduled for public hearing. However, based on recommendations of denial by IDRC, both cases were withdrawn.

Business License and Building Permit Review:

Planning Division staff reviewed and acted on 12 Business License applications and 32 Building Permits in the month of May.

Other Staff Activities:

At a public hearing on May 16th the Council considered an ordinance creating a new Mixed-Use zoning district and passed it with a 7-0 vote. The ordinance will go into effect in June.

On May 26th the Planning Division held a pre-application conference with a local developer for eleven townhomes for consideration on Entrada Drive. The meeting was attended by representatives of all reviewing departments. The developer will return with revised drawings that will take into account input from the pre-application discussion.

Staff has initiated a County-led rezoning action for the Entrada Business Park that would allow the proposed residential development illustrated below.

He produced most of the mapping for the Comprehensive Plan, working steadfastly through many iterations of each graphic until it was close to perfect. His patience and good nature contributed greatly to the process.

Los Alamos Landscaping has mobilized and began working on sloping the soil to prevent wicking and improve longevity.





ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

International Council of Shopping Centers (ICSC)/RECon Retail Convention Report

May 21-24, 2017 Los Alamos County Economic Development Division and Los Alamos Commerce and Development Corporation attended the RECON convention, in Las Vegas, NV. RECON is the single largest retail conference in the nation with 145,000 square feet of exhibits and 37,000 attendees. The group conducted more than 20 face-to-face meetings with both retail businesses and large commercial enterprises, including Hyatt, Marriott, Hilton, Jimmy John's, McAllister's Deli, Chipotle, Hibbett Sports, Dollar Tree, Jiffy Lube, Creamistry, Green Juice, Kroger, Viking Development, Verdad Developers, The Learning Center, and GameStop. Currently, the group is working to secure corporate site visits from Chipotle, Hyatt, Hilton, Viking and Verdad. There will be longer term follow-up required for some of the other companies listed above. Sever of the national chains commented that they no longer open corporate stores and rely heavily on franchises. Based on feedback received from developers and retailers at the conference, County Economic Development and LACDC are exploring the possibility of hosting a "How to become a Franchisee 101" seminar.

2017 Visitor Guide Update

While keeping a close eye on 2015 visitor guide reserves, Economic Development Marketing is taking some extra time to incorporate into the new visitor guide elements of the new branding campaign, as well

as recommendations from the County's Wayfinding Plan and Tourism Strategic Plan process. The guide is now set to go to press the first week of July.

Brand Implementation

Branding consultants, Jim Glover and Marianne Tennenbaum from The Idea Group of Santa Fe, met with key stakeholders from the County and the business community during the month of May to determine priorities for recreation, local business, economic development and community ambassadorship. A branded pop-up exhibit space, information pieces and promotional giveaways are being designed, produced and ordered for use during the busy outdoor event season, beginning with Chamberfest on June 10. Economic Development Staff are handing out invitations to Chamberfest attendees, inviting them to a public meeting on Wednesday, July 19, 5:30 p.m.-6:30 p.m. at Fuller Lodge. The meeting is the first step in defining and recruiting membership to the Discoveries Action Team and the Live, Work, Play and Stay subcommittees. The branding team will give a separate briefing to County Council at their work session at the White Rock Fire Station on Tuesday, July 18.



Visitor Journey A2D Training

Economic Development is working through the New Mexico Hospitality Association to negotiate a contract for tourism awareness training customized to Los Alamos offerings in terms of hotels, restaurants, services, attractions and other industry and community sectors. The A₂D program is designed to teach workers in all sectors of the tourism industry how their actions and attitude can impact a visitor's entire trip, as well as how to positively engage with every visitor, guest and customer. Farmington, Las Cruces and Santa Fe are all in varying stages of training development and execution, and report positive community participation and customer satisfaction.

Economic Development Marketing is working with the County's tourism consultants and the New Mexico Tourism Department (NMTD) North Central Region 5 Board to promote the new New Mexico True campaign: the Enchanted 8 road trips around the state. We are writing to tell you how incredibly helpful you staff were when we had to obtain a fence permit very suddenly.

We had spoken with two of you staff, Tamara Baer and Lee Brammeier last fall at the Homeowners and County forum in White Rock. Ms. Baer discussed fences with us at length providing measurements, distances, and helpful rationale for the requirements. Mr. Brammeier explained replacing bedroom windows and window dimensions in great detail. They both spent about half an hour with us answering our questions. We felt prepared for the future.

The future happened much faster than we expected when in February the huge, old pinon tree in front of the house insisted on dying despite our three years of trying to save it. The County Extension representative informed us that the tree had to be removed by the end of the month so as not to infect other trees. Suddenly we were faced with the need to put up a fence. Fortunately we were prepared because of the notes we took in our conversation with Ms. Baer.

We found someone to do build an attractive coyote fence and modest stone planters to hide our now very naked house. We arranged to have him do the project. He said he'd get the permit. In early March the contractor suddenly appeared at the front door with workmen and materials and no permit.

In a panic, while one of us "planned" the details of the fence and planters, the other went to the County with a rough drawing and distance measurements to see if we could even get a permit.

Your staff were quite simply the nicest, most understanding and helpful people. After a brief explanation of the situation, Michael Arellano immediately got the permitting process started, provided the appropriate forms and answering our questions that came up as we filled in the form. A phone was provided so that additional measurements, materials and depths of digging, could be provided to the County to complete the form. Adrienne Lovato, who was not at all well that day, was so insistent on helping us that she stayed beyond when she was going to leave and made sure everything as set up to be able to issue a permit and make it work that day as quickly as possible. Mark Lujan found our plat with the power, gas, water and sewer lines, checked our drawing and measurements against the plat and said it appeared there weren't any issues since the fence was relatively

small and close to the house, and then drove out to the house to verify the locations. He answered additional questions we had about gas meters and digging near them. He got us in touch with the Line Location people to have them verify and locate the lines. Mr. Arellano checked everything over with Ms. Lovato and within a surprisingly short time we had our permit.

This kind of service is extraordinary. Your staff went "above and beyond" to help us in the permitting process, and answering many questions additionally.

We are grateful for the courteous, caring service your staff provided.
