

Mr Burgess-

I am writing to offer my services to replace Councilor Christine Chandler, who has been elected to the State Legislature. I have served in county government in the past as a Planning and Zoning Commissioner for two years in the early 2000's. During that time the County was wrestling with defining and adopting a County Master Plan. The plan we developed resulted in progress in a number of commercial development areas (such as the Smith Marketplace development), made way for new housing developments, as well as enabling community environmental enhancements.

I understand the difficulties and rewards of serving in a local governing body. If selected, I look forward to working with you in developing and implementing solutions to challenges Los Alamos County faces.

The County is facing a time of belt tightening, as DOE will not authorize Triad National Security LLC to pay gross receipts taxes to the County such as we received from LANS as a for-profit organization managing LANL. During those times, the County was able to accomplish a number of worthwhile things with the extra revenue. Now the county must be more frugal. We must also consider other means of broadening our tax base.

I see a number of opportunities in the near future that can increase the county tax base and also broaden our community demographics and business base.

Housing for the older segment of the community: We love this community, with its spectacular vistas, excellent weather, stimulating social environment, and productive county governance. Upon retirement, many citizens want to stay. At the same time, the Laboratory must hire replacement staff, who also require housing. Housing has often been tight in this community, and we should plan and act so that the community can grow appropriately. A spectrum of attractive senior housing alternatives has been developed elsewhere. These alternatives range from senior apartment communities, and assisted living, to full-time nursing care. Significant progress has been made recently, with the Betty Earnhardt Center, Sombrillo and Aspen Ridge and the Beehive Homes of White Rock as positive steps, but more are needed. As our seniors are provided alternative living options, existing single-family dwellings can become available to new families.

Affordable Housing: While we have made some efforts to provide affordable housing in the community, a very large proportion of the current LANL work force commutes long distances to work here. For many of them, the enticements of living in this great community, sending their children to the terrific Los Alamos Public School system, and reclaiming the chunk of their life devoted to daily commuting, are offset by the unavailability of affordable housing. As importantly, local businesses have difficulty recruiting employees to provide the spectrum of support jobs a thriving business community needs: clerks, stockers, accountants, manufacturing functions, landscaping, construction, etc. The availability

of a strong workforce in these categories will broaden our community, enhance our businesses, and make it a more affordable place to live. It would also broaden our tax base.

A tight and expensive housing market has plagued our community for decades, in spite of a number of efforts to add townhomes, apartments and single family housing. The A19-A development and the potential for new apartments and townhouses are positive steps but may not completely fill the affordable housing need. Subsidized housing is much less desirable than housing developments with intrinsically lower development costs. The County Council must be proactive in enabling affordable housing developments; identifying, acquiring, and zoning appropriate parcels; and working with developers to ensure the development attracts the target demographic.

Technology Spinoff Business enablement: Los Alamos County will greatly benefit from a strong tech business incubator environment for spin-off technology from LANL and Sandia. It is notable that many technologically strong segments of the country have benefitted by spinning off companies from universities and tech businesses (e.g.- Silicon Valley, the Ivy League corridor on the East Coast, the TriCity area of Washington state, the Research Triangle in North Carolina, etc.). Los Alamos County has not provided sufficient tech incubation, nor benefited fully from spin-off business development. We certainly have a large number of skilled, experienced, and capable technologists residing in the community. Many of them have retired. A large number of these people are national assets, and consult for distant enterprises. However, the availability of land and facilities for local business development is a limitation. The lack of affordable housing for staff, as discussed in the Affordable Housing section of this letter, is certainly a constraint. The County Council should make a focused effort to develop a tech incubation and business development strategy to facilitate planting, cultivating, and growing tech business in the community. As we attract and facilitate spin-off tech development business here, our community will have a greater breadth of employment opportunities. We will have a proportionate increase in our tax base from property taxes and transactional taxes.

The above opportunities are before us. We have a history of fine public servants seeking to further the interests of this community. Los Alamos County has attracted a remarkably high-quality population in terms of education, personal discipline, and high values, not to mention frugality and personal wealth acquisition. This is a great place to live, as had been reported by a number of national surveys over the 37 years I have lived and worked here.

Our citizens are also engaged in community government. We have opinions, great ideas, and a desire for quality government. Our people know that by showing up and asserting their views, they can influence community policy. It is important that our County Councilors be ready to engage, be sympathetic, be consensus builders, and yet also be able to assess and address the integrated needs of the community. It is important that our Council have vision, and move the County toward a successful future. I believe I can make a strong contribution to this future.

My experience and qualifications (my detailed resume is available if desired):

- As mentioned above, I served on the Los Alamos County Planning and Zoning Commission for two years.
- From 1994-1997, I was chairman of a 26-nation (NATO and Warsaw Pact) technical working group in Vienna, which over three years developed a technical implementation plan for the Open Skies Treaty, still in use today. This was a very challenging negotiation experience that included managing a US delegation of representatives from a number of Government organizations. I proactively engaged the interests, perceptions, and personalities of delegations from other nations to overcome misunderstandings and to find common technical ground to enable this Treaty to enter into force.
- Following that, I worked in the Pentagon assisting senior leaders in the Departments of Defense and Energy, developing positions and solutions to critical policy issues related to the nuclear weapons forces of the nation. Successes from this time included changes to strengthen the Stockpile Stewardship program, to address DoD needs.
- From 2004, I led a multi-institutional group developing an innovative tactical-intelligence technology (AngelFire) that changed the manner in which the Marine Corps conducts expeditionary warfare.
- After my retirement from LANL in 2012 until last January, I was Chief of the office of the Defense Threat Reduction Agency whose mission was the development of advanced technologies for the detection of clandestine foreign nuclear tests. This was a job engaging the cooperation of a number of Defense and Energy organizations, and other government agencies, including the national laboratories. I managed of an office staff, budget, and contracts. I was certified as a Level III, Federal Science & Technology Acquisition Manager.
- Over my adult life I have been a youth leader in my Church, leading local Boy Scout troops as well as serving at the district level.

I have spent my career largely engaged with diverse interests and entities to accomplish mutually-beneficial ends. I am willing and eager to apply the skills, insights, and my best abilities to serving Los Alamos County on the County Council

Dear Councilors:

You likely know of me from the Council meetings and election debates which I've attended and spoken at. I had expressed an interest in running for Council previously, because of my desire to bring more efficiency and accountability to Los Alamos County (LAC) government. I believe that, after you read the following, you will see that I'm the best candidate to fill the open position.

First, a brief bio: My mother fled Cuba with my sister and me, after having lost my father and all our possessions. After graduating high school, I joined the Navy, where I spent most of the 4 years as a medic with the Marines. After my discharge, I worked as an EMT and put myself through college, and 3 years later became a Paramedic in Broward County, FL. Using the GI Bill, I continued my education and eventually got my MBA. I went to work for Wal-Mart as a manager, but left there and my wife and I had a medical equipment and supply sales/rental business in Taos. One of my friends at Taos County asked for my help in getting the finances of some grants in order, which led to my getting hired in the finance department there. When the purchasing agent left, I was given his job. Three years later, I became the purchasing agent LAC, and retired in 2014. Currently I teach business courses part-time at UNM-LA.

During my time at LAC, my primary goal was to give the taxpayers of the county better service at lower cost. Among the things I did to accomplish that goal:

- 1. Rewrote the Los Alamos County Procurement Code
- 2. Updated the Purchasing Manual
- 3. Updated the County's Asset Disposal Policy
- 4. Created Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) for purchasing
- 5. Created an Operating Procedures Manual for the department staff
- 6. Standardized vendor info entry in the accounting system
- 7. Created a systematic training program:
 - a. Basic Procurement
 - b. POs and Direct Purchase Orders
 - c. Bids and RFPs
 - d. Vendor Training
- 8. Created a vendor information brochure
- 9. Instituted the use of Price Agreements
- 10. Initiated design-build solicitations and contracts
- 11. Expanded the use of Open Purchase Orders for customer ease
- 12. Initiated use of the Procurement Violation Form

I believe that through these measures, particularly the new Procurement Code, LAC has saved many tens of thousands of dollars these past 10 years. My intent is to continue to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of LAC.

In addition to the above, you should be aware that I know LAC inside and out. During my time there, I did "work days" at nearly every county department. This was done so that I could more thoroughly know both the operations and personnel at those departments, and better understand how Purchasing could better serve them. I'm still in touch with a number of these folks, hence my current knowledge of the situations and issues in the county.

From the letter I sent to you recently, you can see that I am still involved and have identified some of the areas which I feel need to be addressed. There are 2 other issues which I think Council needs to look at: the proliferation of so-called Management Analysts, most of whom do little or no analyses and are actually another level of supervisors, and the fleet of vehicles, which have many times more trucks, vans, and SUVs than cars for general use. Overall, I firmly believe that there may be some hard times coming in the near future, and I want to be there to help out.

Besides all the things listed above, I also served on the NM Board of Pharmacy for 5 years, where I re-wrote the EMS-Pharmacy regulations, and got experience with Robert's Rules of Order. Currently I am on the board of KSFR public radio of Santa Fe, where I just helped revise the accounting system used there. Lastly, be advised that I have no particular political leanings and have been registered as independent nearly my whole life.

So, I present this to you for your consideration. I believe, given my varied experiences in both the public and private sector, my knowledge of LAC, and my desire for accountability and to give taxpayers a bigger bang for their bucks, that I am the best person for this job. Sheriff Granville has gotten to know me pretty well over the last 9 months and I would encourage asking him for his opinion of me. We both care dearly about our youth and doing all we can to help them. My unique experiences in life give me a perspective that no one else on the council and most likely no one else applying has.

I have lived in Los Alamos, New Mexico since January 1st, 2012. Previously between the military and construction jobs I have lived in 12 States and seen what works and what doesn't in communities ranging in size from 30 people to 15 million people.

I have experience in a limited legislative nature in student government as a representative in High School and College.

I was basically a paralegal while serving in the U.S. Air Force at Nellis AFB, Las Vegas, Nevada

I was a Federal Law Enforcement Officer in the U.S. Coast Guard at Boston Station, Boston Harbor, Boston, Massachusetts.

I was a local Law Enforcement Officer at New York New York Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas, Nevada.

I have a degree in Psychology from Park University, Parkville, Missouri, https://www.park.edu and was licensed in California working at a home for boys on probation.

During my life I have had some high paying, but mostly low paying jobs and also have been homeless several times.

I was bullied at school and suffered physical and verbal abuse at home growing up.

I am transgender (as I've mentioned at Council meetings before).

I am approaching senior citizen and am disabled.

All of my life experiences put together I believe give me a unique background to help tackle the problems Los Alamos faces. Some of the most important being:

- 1) We have a child suicide rate 5x's the national average.
- 2) Our children suffer from bullying in the schools as well as social media. (while we have a school board if I had an official position I would be more able to address bullying and suicide).
- 3) Too many of our children are getting into trouble with the courts and for our elementary and middle schooler's there are few organized chaperoned after school and school break activities.
- 4) We have an extreme lack of affordable housing directly affecting small businesses here to hire and keep staff. And from observation for every new business that opens or expands here one closes.
- 5) Our drunk driving and crime continue to increase as we have a very high turnover rate of Police Officers who come here to get experience then transfer to a higher paying force in cities with more "action" than our town's criminals. And our free bus to take people home from bars stops at 8:30pm which is the time most people go out not home.

- 5) The GRT base needs to be expanded so we can look to LANL for amenities not necessities. This involves creative thinking and new ideas for tourism rather than simply relying on promoting what already exists.
- 6) We need to seriously consider changing areas of the Charter so that there is consistency from year to year and Council to Council. As well as follow our own Charter and laws or change them.
