
















WHAT THE PROJECT IS

 - ✓ Creates a long-term vision and goals for future growth
 - ✓ High-level master planning document
 - ✓ Does not create zoning standards but provides guidance on how to update the development code
 - ✓ Will be adopted as part of the Comprehensive Plan
- Phase 2 is a comprehensive update of the Chapter 16 Development code
 - ✓ Addresses existing challenges with Chapter 16
 - ✓ Revises standards and procedures
 - ✓ Implements National best Practices
 - ✓ Incorporates recommendations from Phase 1





Rank the existing Visual Identity / Urban Form goals in order of importance:








