

RDC Written Progress Report to Los Alamos County Year 3 – Q2 (October - December, 2023)

Overview

This report provides an overview of the tasks, services, and outcomes completed in the first quarter of the third year of the seven-year agreement between the Regional Development Corporation (RDC), a private non-profit 501c3 economic development organization, and Los Alamos County (LA County). The agreement covers a service area that includes Taos, Rio Arriba, Los Alamos, and Santa Fe counties (four-county service area).

With the support of the Los Alamos Economic Development Administrator, the Executive Directors of the RDC and North Central New Mexico Economic Development District (NCNMEDD) made a presentation on the Regional Economic Development Initiative (REDI) Strategic Plan update to the Los Alamos County Council on November 28th. The Council approved support for The Plan. Los Alamos County, the RDC, and NCNMEDD all agreed to proceed with meetings with regional community leaders. The RDC recommended that the annual REDI Summit take place in the first quarter of 2024 with a focus on getting general buy-in for The Plan.

This quarter, the RDC:

- ✓ Received support for the REDI Strategic Plan Update from the Los Alamos County Council
- ✓ Compiled metrics and survey results from RDC Micro-Grant and Technology & Manufacturing Fund awardees
- ✓ Sponsored the New Mexico Outdoor Economic Summit
- ✓ Held Business Connectivity Events in Taos and Espanola (70+ participants)
- ✓ Sponsored a 2-Day **Workforce Integration Network (WIN) Event** in Taos
- ✓ Held an online interactive three-part workshop on Marketing
- ✓ Met with the **New Mexico Partnership** to discuss how to manage PRO's for the region

Quarterly Progress Summary by Agreement Category

Regional Strategic Plan Update

• The Regional Strategic Plan Update was endorsed by the Los Alamos County Council on November 28th. The RDC and NCNMEDD plan to begin meetings with regional community leaders to discuss The Plan.

Regional Economic Development Strategy Implementation & Forum

 Based on The Plan Update, the RDC has started to update strategies for the implementation of a four-county workplan.

Economic Development Organization (EDO) Training


- Patrick Vanderpool, the RDC's new Executive Director, the past Chair of the International Economic Development Council's (IEDC) Education and Certification Committee, is uniquely qualified to assist with EDO training in the region.
- The RDC has had conversations with local Economic Developers (ED) to determine their needs and promote the advantages of IEDC and OUEDI's training that leads to certification.
- In order to further determine EDO training needs, monthly meetings lead by Patrick Vanderpool for regional Economic Development Organizations (EDOs) are expected to begin in January 2024.

Business Retention & Expansion

The RDC's Business Retention and Expansion Program consists of four components: 1) Outreach/Site Visits to regional businesses, 2) Direct Investments (grants and a no-interest loans that are awarded in an annual, competitive process), 3) Workshops on topics of interest to regional businesses, and 4) PROs for the region

BR&E Visits


✓ **RDC Interacted with 53 Businesses** in the four-county service area; 18 interactions were inperson, 4 were via phone calls, and 31 were via RDC events.




Direct Investments (grants and no-interest loans)

- ✓ No new grants and no-interest loans were awarded this quarter.
- ✓ RDC Micro-Grant and TEAM Fund awardees were sent a year-end survey to collect metrics to evaluate the year and determine the focus for next year's RDC's events and workshops.
 - Both groups showed increases in revenue over 2022
 - Both groups showed a substantial increase in new jobs created in 2023

Business challenges varied between the mostly rural small business that were awarded Micro-Grants and the higher growth-potential technology and manufacturing businesses. Marketing-related issues were the top challenge for Micro-Grant awardees, and cash flow-related issues were the top challenge for the TEAM Fund awardees. Staffing-related issues were high on both lists.

Human Capital Initiatives

Skilled Trades - Workforce Integration Network (WIN) Project

The project's goal is to build a qualified Northern New Mexico workforce in the construction and skilled trades industries by streamlining and aligning academic and non-academic training programs and services. As a sub-recipient to the 3-year \$6.4 M Good Jobs Challenge grant awarded to NCNMEDD, the RDC is responsible for developing the skilled trades pipeline in Northern New Mexico. Work completed this quarter includes:

✓ A bi-annual convening of over 100 stakeholders in the Skilled Trades and Healthcare sectors took
place in Taos on November 2-3. Priorities for focused actions across the region were developed by
employers and supported by educators, government agencies, and regional non-profit
organizations.
