Electric rates (addressed for now); ECA (Board still effectively out of loop); Distribution System Plan (study completed, planning just starting); Elk Ridge (on-going); Foxtail Flats Business Plan (just starting)

These are difficult economic times. There are many in Los Alamos who are struggling to pay the bills. 91% of the residents of Los Alamos are not willing to spend more than \$20 per month extra to pay for electrification. The board doesn't seem to pay any attention to these 91%.

Elk Ridge gas, Foxtail Flats (business plan), electrification, aging infrastructure across multiple-systems, delays related to federal gov (Jemez Mountain Fire Pro, foxtail, ECA), White Rock - board did a good job

Rate and rate structure changes...could do better in terms of communications. Elk Ridge...did well in showing support for community and following progress. Electrification study...need to continue to provide clarity/factual basis around costs associated with anticipated electrification versus asset aging. BPU needs to continue to request information regarding planning around Foxtail Flats (including updates re prioritizing of options) and issues around drought and infrastructure limitations of hydroelectric assets.
