# **Utilities Manager's Report August 20, 2025**

- 1. For the replacement transformer at the White Rock sub-station, DPU has been working on several fronts. First is setting up a temporary tie to LANL at Monte Rey South and SR-4. Staff have worked through a design with LANL, and we will receive LANL work estimate by the end of this week to begin installing this temporary tie next week. The voltage regulators required for the tie can be reused once a replacement transformer is in operation. Procurement has opened a quick bid process due by the end of this week to receive quotes on a replacement transformer. The selection of the replacement transformer will be flexible to best fit schedule, potential to upsize to meet future growth and considering both reconditioned and new transformer options. DPU hopes to be reviewing these proposals next Monday. Finally, DPU is requesting a mutual aid type agreement with PNM to use their mobile transformer if necessary.
- 2. For Elk Ridge, the first segment of the new gas line has been connected to LANL and today the line is being pressure tested. Over the next couple of weeks some of the trailers will be tied over to the new line. The project is proceeding as planned with completion projected in October.
- 3. The Deputy Utility Manager for Electric Distribution is currently advertised, and it closes on August 22<sup>nd</sup>. Over the next two weeks staff will interview the Business Operations Manager and Engineering Aide. The Engineering Associate vacancy over the last seven months has not resulted in finding a qualified applicant. I have closed this recruitment and opened a new one that has been upgraded to an Engineering Project Manager. This upgraded position is consistent with the Distribution System Electrification Plan recommendation and it will require a P.E. in electrical engineering. We have filled 1 billing and service specialist and are looking to fill the last vacancy.
- 4. NNSA Albuquerque procurement office still has a target date of August 25<sup>th</sup> to deliver the final form of the ECA with all the terms and conditions. On a positive note, LANL receive their FONSI for the third power line. This means that LANL can now move from a 30% design to 100% design over the next year and hopefully by fall of next year the project will be under construction.
- 5. LA Inc completed the North Road Lift Station in May. Since then, they have not made much progress on the Los Arboles lift station (approximately 10% in 4 months). DPU issued termination notice on Friday. Purchasing Division has authorized us to proceed as an emergency due to poor condition of existing lift station. We are working with Allied 360 to establish task order to complete the open project. The goal is to bring the Task Order to BPU next month. Substantial completion would have been next week for LA Inc. We will be notifying their bond company later this week.

- 6. Foxtail Flats has received the FONSI for the project. DESRI is now working on a detailed construction schedule and time for delivery of this energy.
- 7. The proposed award for the Jemez Fire Protection Project has cleared the headquarters review and is still awaiting Secretary Noem's approval. The first phase of the water pipeline and tank are due to be completed by the end of September.
- 8. I attended the UAMPS Annual Members Conference, and I received a five-year service award as a UAMPS board member. The conference covered several topics regarding vegetative management, fire insurance issues and planning, EDAM, CAISO, transmission availability, and two guest speakers on management topics. The two geothermal projects are still working through the transmission studies. Therefore, the Cove Fort II PPA is not yet ready for review. The CFPP will close on September 30<sup>th</sup> and then there will be some final billing and reimbursement with the DOE cooperative agreement to finalize.
- 9. The Pathway to Zero Natural Gas project survey is open until September 8<sup>th</sup>. Once the survey is closed and data analyzed, I should be able to share some preliminary results.
- 10. Met again with the General Manager of Jemez Mountain Electric Coop and we shared the four-page amendment LAC did with NORA a few years back to use as a template when Jemez develops some new wheeling rates. They are in need to repair and replace poles along a 20-mile corridor that we share. Once they complete their capital planning they will be back in touch with DPU on finalizing an amendment.
- 11. Reviewed the proposals for the County's federal lobbyist. It is anticipated Council will approve the selected firm in September.
- 12. The US Forest Service program manager managing the County's land acquisition request took the retirement package from DOGE and the new manger has not been able to meet with us given the summer fires. The Forest Service next steps are to set up meetings with the Pueblos and organize a public meeting regarding the land transfers. Given these extended delays, we will need to develop a gap contract with our environmental consultant once we can gain more information from the Forest Service on the remaining tasks to complete the transaction.
- 13. Attended the SJGS Decommissioning and Mine Reclamation meetings. The SJGS completed the last implosion, and most of the remaining work is to haul away the scrap steel. Given the volume of scrap, it is anticipated the removal will run into February of next year. The last item is the groundwater pump and treat of the Shumway waters. There are some additional monitoring wells being installed to determine the background metal levels and compare these results with the influent waters to determine if this element of the project can be closed out sooner. For the mine reclamation project, there were some work elements shifted around to reclaim with an eye to close out the project by 2030 and then there will be

vegetative monitoring afterwards for several years. Both projects are running close to our budget and there should be sufficient reserves to cover all remaining work.



#### How Young People Are Leading the Climate Fight: Montana's Youth Climate Activists:

Kicking off this years' Summit are the youth climate activists from Livingston, Montana, an unlikely incubator for climate action. With a population of about 9,000, Livingston is situated in a fossil fuel-driven, Republican-led state where leaders

are actively working to hinder efforts to combat climate change. But students at the local Park High School have been leaders in the fight for change, and their impact has stretched far beyond their homes

A participant in a student climate club was one of the 16 plaintiffs who sued the state of Montana in 2020 alleging that, through its fossil fuel-centric policies, the state was violating their constitutionally enshrined right to "a clean and healthfu ment." Following a victory that was upheld by the Montana Supreme Court, current and former members of the club joined another lawsuit in May, arguing that the President's executive orders on climate and the environment infringe on young people's fundamental rights.

#### No Miracles Needed: How To Transition Communities, States and Countries to 100% Clean, Renewable Energy For Everything

Global warming, air pollution, and energy insecurity are three of the most significant problems facing the world today. This talk discusses the development of technical and economic roadmaps to solve these problems in on-grid and off-grid communities, the fifty United States, and countries worldwide. The solution is to electrify buildings, transport, and industry and provide the electricity with 100% clean, renewable wind, water, and sunlight (WWS) and storage. Results indicate the grid can remain stable at low cost in all 50 states and each of 150 countries examined. Aside from mitigating global warming, these roadmaps have the potential to eliminate over seven million air pollution deaths annually, reduce international conflict over energy, stabilize energy prices, reduce catastrophic risk, and create jobs. The talk also discusses why we do not need "miracle" technologies such as carbon capture, direct air capture, blue hydrogen, small modular nuclear reactors, or bioenergy.
