### Q1. Which lion sculpture design do you prefer?

Text Responses:

Policing without aggression.

Less aggressive appearance, yet still conveying strength. Something that I feel is especially important at this time.

Concerns about the tail in the Jocelyn Russell sculpture being more at risk of damage

The roar portrays danger, conflict, fight, anger, and force. The calmer lion portrays strength, protection, fierce but calm, and watchfulness.

Price including installation

Watchful but not menacing

Height of second off the ground

The first design is frightening! Think of children looking at the sculpture.

Artist reputation, regional exclusivity, not aggressive

Liked both favor B

Both are beautiful; however, I prefer the darker mane of Option B.

Strength without overt aggression

I like the lion posed on the pedestal and the overall length of the installation

Price

I like that it is on the ground instead of a pedestal.

Price includes installation. Also prefer original and unique design.

Overall preferred the posture of Borup's lion. And worried that the tail on Russell's would be susceptible to breakage. That said, I liked the non-roaring aspect of Russell's lion better.

The fact that it is already created is also a factor.

I like the mane better

B shows more strength, protection, courage and vigilance while A shows some aggression.

Female artist

The Russell lion appears resolute and dignified. The Borup lion appears to be roaring at nothing in particular, which does not convey any of the intended themes.

Considering the recent murders of 6 American citizens, and the injuring and false charges brought against hundreds more, by ICE, I feel the roaring lion is way too aggressive.

closed mouth conveys more protection and vigilance, less aggression

It's elegant.

Jocelyn is world famous artist and is a cousin to myself and the Houlton family who have been in Los Alamos since 1963

I prefer the proposed installation design (sculpture mounted above ground level). It represents a vantage point from which the lion can protect his pride.

Option B less apt to frighten children.

Jocelyn is my first cousin

Female artist!

The piece by artist Russell is uniquely majestic, not just a standard lion statue you see anywhere

Daniel's fits with the other statues nearby better.

Stature of the presentation represents a \*calm\* strength, which is needed in the current political climate. The other statue is wonderful in its own right, but to me would not be suitable to be placed in front of the police station.

Direction the lion is facing in placement and size. B is too big

The sculptor's background and research.

Option A: is too aggressive as it roaring. This is not a good theme for community policing.

I liked that Jocelyn studied lions in Africa. I think it is more realistic and I don't like Daniel's scary lion face. I think it will scare children and make them not want to go into the justice center.

Want to support women artists, don't like the lion's snarl in the first one, too aggressive

Text Responses:

I question placing a lion much less one roaring in front of Police Dept.--seems very random and unfriendly.

I don't want my tax money funding this. I'd like it to go to improving the ice rink.

I understand the interest in using lion imagery, but I would much prefer to see it be a mountain lion, native to New Mexico. In fact, I would also ask that the APPB members consider using a New Mexican artist for this project.

Waste of tax dollars.

Waste of taxpayer money when the aquatic center can't even maintain decent showers.

I would prefer a sculpture of our native wildlife like a mountain lion. It fits in better with sharing things that are part of our area.

Don't waste money on this project

The proposed \$55,000 fee could be better spent elsewhere in Los Alamos

Waste of resources!

African lions don't reflect the NM experience. A mountain lion would be more appropriate.

What does an African lion have to do with Los Alamos or anything in New Mexico? It looks like a foreigner, ridiculous, a zoo lion, a circus lion. It's inappropriate. It doesn't fit. Like a giraffe or elephant.

This is a waste of taxpayer money

I think an other design (such as a German Shepherd dog, or a regional cat such as a mountain lion, would be a more appropriate art piece for the police department

Why are we putting a lion at the police station? I think the symbolism is off-target. Let's get something closer to "protect and serve"?

Price

An African lion does not belong in New Mexico. A mountain lion would be awesome.

We don't have any African lions around here. It doesn't fit the environment. How about some squirrels or ravens?

Too much money for these Sculptures

Since we have mountain lions in our community and in our mountains - a statue similar to a local mountain lion could be appropriate. I actually do not like the sculpture by Borup as it is over the top aggressive. Option B by Russell is too tall. I think go back to the drawing board! If we have to have a lion, let's have a local mountain lion. Something more friendly would be better - a marmot, a beaver, a deer. (elk seems too big).

Keep it local. Don't use an African lion. If the police want a lion as a model, use a mountain lion of the species native to Los Alamos County.



A mountain lion or bear, or anything that relates to the Jemez Mountains would be more appropriate.

Be prepared for kids climbing on it like the elephant one.

This doesn't make a better police force or a better community.

Style - in my opinion, a roaring lion all puffed up (option A) seems a bit aggressive in this political climate, especially with the controversial landscape and views of the public against police officers. Not saying it's right, just pointing out the growing schism between the two groups.

As stated above, I personally feel a lion sculpture feels silly and unrelated to police work. Some other form of animal artwork that more appropriately reflects either the work of law enforcement or our local fauna would be a more appealing art piece for our area.

Quiet strength

Don't like the open mouth of the other option. Any concerns about the durability of the tail? Seems like people may climb on it or something.

Pick something more relatable to the area.

The first one is way too aggressive

Both are beautiful but for a sculpture embodying the police ethic, the Russell piece conveys calm and vigilant protector. In today's social context, I gravitate toward this more than the roaring lion, which could impart more a feeling of aggression.

Open mouth, to me, seems aggressive. After ICE raids, I don't think it's a good luck for good neighborhood policing.

Cost of installation

The Borup sculpture is beautiful, but I think it appears aggressive and even possibly scary to little children. The Russel sculpture is more regal and dignified.

I believe the lion belongs with the officers memorial.

What do you want to communicate about LAPD? Option A looks scary, fierce, antagonistic, aggressive. Option B has an aura of power and strength. I also get a sense of loyalty and protection. I think the expression of the lion makes a tremendous difference on the perception of the local police force.

I honestly thought it might be of a Mountain Lion since we have them in our backyard.

How about a local mountain lion (Puma concolor)?

B gives power and authority and protection

Jocelyn's lion is majestic.

Why in the world does the police station need a \$55,000 statue!?! Where will the money come from? How will the statue help the police better-serve the public!?! How about investing those funds in tools that can advance police efforts in aiding the public, i.e. drones, thermal cameras, night vision optics/cameras. People hike the hills and canyons around Los Alamos and it's only a matter of time before someone goes hiking and doesn't return due to injury or emergency reasons. Searching canyons and hills require a large amount of people power and takes a great deal of time. A camera mounted on a drone plus a competent operator could be searching up and down our hills and canyons in both daylight and after dark. A drone and a competent operator could provide timely information concerning localized fire outbreaks near our various housing areas which could prove beneficial in helping PD develop and implement evacuation plans. In the event of an actual crime involving a fleeing suspect, the drone and competent operator could provide officers on the ground with valuable information regarding a suspect's location and current activities. Another thought....how about providing the PD with some teddy bears for their patrol vehicles. These could have the PAC-8 logo on them and be given out to young children in conditions of extreme stress. How about sponsoring some child car seats to be handed out parents in-need? These could also have the logo on them. Just a few things \$55K could help with. A metal lion, hmm....how could it help the public? How could it help those who have been sworn to "serve and protect"? How does it make the community better? Yeah....nothing comes to mind right away. One thing is for sure....there'd be another dandy statue for new-hires, interns and tourists to go around and see during their walking tour of the city while local art aficionados could pat themselves on the back for having contributed to a lion being installed just outside of our local Cop Shop. If the money is free and clear and doesn't come from the tax rolls, and you absolutely have to have a lion outside the Cop Shop so those in Blue can feel good about themselves, then go for it. Otherwise, is it really necessary?

Why not a mountain lion?

Do we have money to waste on useless figures in front of public buildings?

Replace the design with something Northern New Mexico: Coyote, Cougar, Local Native Art design. How about something with color? How about active Geometric moving art?

Why not a native mountain lion?

If we're going to get a lion statue (which I don't agree with in terms of design at all) It's more appropriate to have one with an expression more of "protecting" rather than roaring. In my opinion having a lion roaring outside a police station is a terrible decision based on current law enforcement in the news injuring the public who they're supposed to protect.

The County should NOT spend taxpayer dollars on art, which will not bring tourists or small businesses to the County. The County has actual problems that this money could help to address.

How about something that reflects the community or the region? A lion? Seriously? The board must have been slipped some of the drugs that the LAPD ignores coming into the community. Why so literal? Why not something from a New Mexico artist? This symbol feels a lot like classic overcompensation for the broad shortcomings and insecurity of our tiny-town police department.

Fix the roads and add artistic value with trees

The first one seems more aggressive, the second one is stoic

Something more representative of NM or made/designed by a NM artist would be preferable

The roaring lion sends the wrong message -- to me, it reflects the chest-thumping attitude of some law enforcement officers, who escalate situations, often leading to tragic consequences.

Have more patrols checking on the statues we already have. People put bunny ears and santa hats on the mountain lion, sunglasses on Oppenheimer. It destroys the look.

Keep art in public places relevant to the venue.

More functional are like artistic benches, ramadas, and art that fits our town in a rocky mountain theme.. This lion does not seem to fit our town. The justice center already has a silhouette type art sculpture that is of first responders and this is very fitting.

What does a lion have to do with policing or justice? Why are our taxpayer dollars being spent on such a frivolous, unnecessary lawn ornament?

The police decided on the design. Well, that's rather self serving.

Have option B face the building and a little smaller

I like how the lion by Russell is depicted on a platform to make it higher and more visible. Please keep that aspect.

Russell's has better use of color (i.e. not monochrome). It also has better expression. Borup's version is aggressive and intimidating and implies violence; Russell's conveys strength and wariness, but is calm and observant. I sincerely hope that the department doesn't see Borup's sculpture as being an accurate representation of their feelings toward the community. People are already wary of cops and the justice system - an \*\*\*\*\* lion out front isn't likely to engender warm feelings or make going to the building any sort of pleasant experience whatever side you're on. Either way, it's a pointless 50k statue only meant for people to feel something going in the building. Russell's is a pleasant enough piece of art, and appropriate for a democratic institution. "\*\*\*\*\* lion" sums up my thoughts of Borup's sculpture.

I would prefer neither. A lion is trite. We have a beautiful endemic mountain lion in the collection. This is not the mission of the art collection. The police department should not be projecting such blatant aggression. Hence if one is selected it should be the less aggressive expression of Jocelyn's. I expect the committee to dig deeper for symbolism in this political era.

Why a lion? Reminds me of Las Vegas. Local wildlife would be much more appropriate. Mountain lion, bobcat, elk, deer. There has to be a NM artist that can create something beautiful. Support in-state artists.

This is not a good use of taxpayer money

Should be of a native species.

Maybe we need to back off on the number of statues we have in LA County. \$55000 is a lot of money (plus installation) and could be used for any number of other projects. Remember the statue at Meadow and Overlook Park in White Rock? Didn't that cost a lot of money to install and it was put up only because it was taking up too much room in storage and no one wanted it in a prominent spot? Was it donated by some rich dude who was upset it wasn't being shown? Not even sure what it is. Murals are easy, can be changed, are colorful and can be part of a theme. We have a lot of wall space and owners could be encouraged to allow for painting a mural that is classy and temporary. \$55000 could also spray a lot of weeds, thistle and other invasives, playground/play lot updates, a shade structure over the splash pad in White Rock, seems you only want to consider statues, which are permanent. A lion statue is nice, but African Lions are not native to this part of the world? So the cops can have their picture taken in front of it? Does the county have so much money that they feel they have to spend it on Statues of non-native wildlife?

Don't place it at the police station.

I like the realism of the open-mouthed lion its posture could convey more aggression, too. This is likely not a value that the police department or our county wants to convey.

It seems a bit strange to install an African lion here even if it is a traditional symbol. How about a mountain lion?

Put art where people gather in town. This would be better served at Smiths or Starbucks or downtown.

A lion in front of a police station is an oxymoron

I chose option A, but in the picture it looks small. If you could scale up it about 3x that would be much better! If he could also add like brown or bronze or different metal colors to the major parts of the lion that would be great.

Choice A is aggressive. Choice B is much more regal, dignified and powerful.

Police force should be calm but alert, steadfast and strong, not snarling.

I prefer Jocelyn Russel's design as her sculpture evokes quiet strength.

NM artist, NM or LA interest and themes, expectations of being interacted with by kids and families.

I don't understand the concept of a lion in this part of the world. It does not represent New Mexico.

It's dumb.

Police need to be calm, strong, and levelheaded which I feel Ms. Russell's sculpture conveys. The roaring lion makes me think of intimidation and violence which is not what I support in law enforcement personnel.

While both statues are attractive and well sculpted, I preferred option B (Russell) due to its sense of quiet strength and vigilance. The lion appears vigilant and calm, ready to act if necessary. Option A (Borup) is caught in mid roar, and gives the impression of aggression. The roar indicates an animal that is attempting to draw attention to itself and make itself the focus. Since this sculpture is supposed to represent the Los Alamos police department, I would prefer a sculpture that symbolizes that the department is a quiet protector of our community, ready and waiting to spring into action if needed, but not one that needs to be in the spotlight when working, and not one that feels that noisy aggression is the best way to keep us safe.

Lion mouth open feels aggressive - do not recommend that in front of police station
