

AIRPORT

STATS Update

Take-offs and Landings – October continued the trend of favorable flying weather at the Los Alamos County Airport, resulting in solid operational activity throughout the month. A total of 338 aircraft operations were recorded, consisting of 129 based aircraft operations and 209 visiting operations (per Virtower data). Classic Air Medical helicopter activity remained steady at about 110 operations.



On October 31, the Los Alamos Fire Department took delivery of the salvaged Jetstream 31 aircraft, which has now been positioned on the west ramp for regional ARFF training. The goal of the project is to provide firefighters with hands-on experience practicing aircraft extrication, emergency response coordination, and fire-suppression techniques on a full-size airframe. This platform also supports

multi-agency drills and improves preparedness for real-world aviation incidents. The Fire Department





Inside the terminal, assembly of the newly redesigned kitchen is underway, following the removal of the original cabinetry in October. The Airport Manager is also preparing snow-removal equipment for winter operations and coordinating with the Traffic & Streets Division to ensure airfield surfaces, access roads, and lighting infrastructure are ready for seasonal conditions. Behind the scenes, work continues both the Taxiway-F design effort and the T-Hangar Project, with teams progressing through planning, coordination, and early design phases.

Looking ahead, the Airport is partnering with EAA Chapter 691 to host the third annual Santa Fly-In on Saturday, December 20, bringing a holiday aviation event to local families and continuing a growing community tradition.

CAPITAL PROJECTS & FACILITIES

Los Alamos County is working on a variety of projects that support quality of life, infrastructure, and economic development initiatives.

The design development for the FS 4 replacement is in progress. The design is reviewing the design development documents.

The Ice Rink permanent chiller was handed over to Ice Rink staff on November 13. Ice making operations are in progress. The Ice Rink was open to the public on November 28, 2025.



The installation of EV charger at the Muni Building continues. Contractor completed the flatwork and is currently working on the landscaping.



AkitaBox is up and running. The team is currently transitioning all workflows to the new system and collaborating with account representatives to resolve a few remaining issues.

The installation of the fire suppression system at the Los Alamos Little Theatre has been completed. The contractor is finalizing punch list items. In addition to this work, thermal insulation on the roof deck and new led lighting were installed throughout the building. Capital Projects and Facilities staff replaced the existing gas fired water heaters with a single on-demand water electric heater.

The Custodial Division continues to promote innovative approaches, conscientious stewardship and outstanding customer service while delivering clean and safe results to the County.

Our Division also promotes outstanding customer service support through the Fuller Lodge Reservations Office, helping customers reserve and plan their events at County indoor facilities.

Reservations for the month of November remained steady compared to October with most weekends booked for the next couple of months at Fuller Lodge.

Floor work was completed at Fuller Lodge, Ice Rink and sections of the Municipal Building.

Preparation for snow removal was completed with stocking supplies, annual trainings on equipment and procedures and staff schedules.

ENGINEERING

The Engineering Division is actively managing numerous design, construction, maintenance, and development review projects aligned with the County Council's strategic priorities for infrastructure, mobility, and economic vitality.

Staff have been assisting with the review and inspection of the Hills Apartments, a multi-year development that received certificates of occupancy for two phases in October and November.

Staff presented the Pinon School Trail to the Transportation Board in November. This project is complementary to the NM- Crossing and Muli-Use Trail project and will provide trail connectivity from that project through school property to Grand Canyon Drive in White Rock.

Staff will be presenting two important projects to Council in December: 1.) The Trinity Drive Safety and ADA project will be at Council on December 2 to execute a maintenance agreement for a new Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) that will be installed as part of the project. 2.) Later in December or early January a request for approval of a new HAWK signal installation and maintenance agreement will be brough to council as part of the NM-4 Crossing and Multi-Use Trail project.

Preparation is underway for soliciting bids for several key projects, including the Finch Street project, Trinity Drive Safety and ADA Improvements, and the NM-4 Multi-Use Trail and Crossing.

Design development by staff is underway for two Capital Improvements Projects for Denver Steels Phase III and Fairway Drive. These projects are joint-utility projects and are anticipated to be advertised for bids in 2026 for 2026/2027 construction.

The Engineering Division continues to play an active role in reviewing developer applications, conducting inspections, and approving construction permits and design reviews. Recent reviews have covered a diverse range of projects, such as the Christus Development, A-8-A near DP Road, 20th Street Development, the Guesthouse Hotel (old Hilltop House site), the Women's Dormitory Building, and the Hills Apartments/35th Street Realignment. Other reviews include the Century Bank, Sherwood Rounds off Longview Drive, Arbolada, and the redevelopment of the Motel 6 building.

As part of the "Operation Save the Bears" initiative, Environmental Services delivered 260 dumpsters to the business community and 1,000 roll carts to residential customers during the first wave of the program. In December 2024, Environmental Services received an additional 1,154 Kodiak Bear-Resistant Carts and has since distributed more than 1,100 to residents that requested one.

Bears are fattening up for hibernation, and we've received an increasing number of reports about trash carts being raided. To help prevent wildlife encounters and keep our neighborhoods safe, residents are encouraged to consider using bear-resistant trash carts. If you're interested in requesting one, please visit www.losalamosnm.us/gogreen to submit a request.

Yard-trimming collection in Los Alamos is coming to an end for the season. As winter approaches, the Environmental Services Division is reminding residents that curbside pickup of yard waste will pause after the final scheduled collection the week of December 1, 2025. During this seasonal break, no brown-cart, yard-trimming pickups will occur. Residents are encouraged to hold material until service resumes next spring, compost when possible, or take yard debris to the Eco Station during regular hours. With one more collection to go Environmental Services collected a total of 941 tons of yard material at the curb in 2025.



The diversion rate is the percent of recyclable and compostable material diverted from the landfill.









November Operations Report


The **Signs and Markings Crew** completed final layout and striping work on San Ildefonso and North Mesa Road following the recent asphalt improvements. They also striped the new island configuration on Camino Entrada, including all required symbols and legends. Crosswalks on Central Avenue were repainted, and striping for the Little Theater parking lot was finished. In addition, the crew fabricated and installed approximately 15 new signs, including an Adopt-A-Road sign on North Mesa Park Road, and addressed several sign knockdowns throughout the area.

The **Traffic Division** conducted traffic counts at three key locations on State Road 4 in White Rock. The team replaced a damaged traffic mirror at the intersection of Rose Street and Circle Drive. They also repaired a streetlight pole equipped with cameras and communication equipment at NM 502 and Airport Drive after it was struck by a vehicle.

The **Streets Crew** excavated, prepared, and paved the intersection at Cheryl and Aragon Avenues. Crews performed potholing on Rendija Canyon Road, Orange Street, and other locations across the county. Additional work included tree trimming on Alamo Drive, repairing an eroded culvert on 33rd Street, replacing a concrete gutter at 2306 Canyon Glen, and repairing a damaged culvert on 35th Street. The crew also assisted with traffic control for the Trick-or-Treat on MainStreet event, helped set up snow-removal equipment for the event to showcase our snow removal operations, and participated in handing out candy.

In preparation for winter operations, crews provided snow-removal training and completed maintenance on snow-removal equipment. They also trimmed trees and brush along State Road 4 at Mirador Boulevard to improve sight distance. Base course material was hauled from Española for several ongoing projects. At the ice rink, crews drilled holes around a junction box for future bollard installation. Additionally, paving work was completed at the White Rock tennis courts.

Administrative staff processed and issued 29 permits and extended 2 permits.







My name is Rhonda Ekblad, and we recently moved to the Mirador subdivision in White Rock.



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NM-4 Crossing and Multi-Use Trail and Pinon Elementary School Trail Extension	PW	This project will create an at-grade crossing of NM State Road 4 in White Rock at the Mirador Subdivision and provide both new multi-use trail infrastructure and reconstructed trail infrastructure in the Pinon Park area. The county received design and construction grant funding from NMDOT for this project. A separate grant was also received to extend the trail network through the Pinon Elementary School to Grand Canyon Drive The designs are being completed by Bohannon Huston and will be advertised for construction early next year with construction continuing through 2026.
Trinity Drive Safety and ADA	PW	This project is the result of a 2016 road safety audit and has been awarded grant funding from the Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program by NMDOT. A resolution of support was made by Council in September 2024 approving a Hybrid Road Diet, one of the alternatives presented by the engineer Wilson and Co. The design has been finalized with construction anticipated to begin in 2026.
Finch Street	PW	This project design was completed by an on-call engineering firm. The project is anticipated to be advertised for bids in late 2025. Council approved an agreement with the Los Alamos Medical Center for the transfer of land for the construction of the Finch Street project in August 2023. Construction is anticipated to begin in 2026.
Canyon Rim Trail Phase III	PW	The project design and right-of-way (ROW) acquisitions are underway from Knecht Street to 15 th Street. The design is being completed by an on-call engineering firm, Wilson and Co. The project is anticipated to be advertised for bids in Fall 2026 with construction occurring in late 2026/2027. Completion of the trail design from 15 th Street to 20 th Street is pending ROW acquisitions.

Denver Steels Phase	PW	This project was awarded to TLC Plumbing and Utility (Spear D). The joint project with the Department of Public Utilities includes full road reconstruction along with utility upgrades. The project is anticipated to begin construction in spring 2026.
