May not reimburse expenses incurred prior to the settlements


Must follow state laws

- 7. Provide treatment and supports during pregnancy and post-partum period
- 8. Expand services for neonatal opioid withdrawal syndrome
- 9. Ensure data collection

Expand Prevention Services and Harm Reduction Programs

- Expand prevention services through amended MOA with the Los Alamos Public Schools
- Contract to provide evidence-based trainings to interested community members, first responders, medical and behavioral health personnel
- Create targeted outreach and education events for specific groups, including youth and older adults

Improve Treatment Options at Detention Center

- Implement online treatment options for people who are incarcerated at the Los Alamos Detention Center
 - Supports treatment goals for those who want to begin / continue recovery process before release
 - Supports reduction in recidivism rates

Address Recovery Supports

- Implement services that support recovery posttreatment and/or post-detention
 - Contract for a Certified Peer Specialist position
 - Expands wraparound services that help support people in recovery

Professional Development

- Training and Professional Development needs of County staff
 - To enhance knowledge of best practices to best serve individuals in need
