We have collaborated for over twenty years in sculpture, multimedia, and installation art, producing public commissions and exhibitions that bridge art, architecture, and urban design. Our practice is rooted in site-responsive works that blend symbolic power, technical innovation, and contemporary craftsmanship. We believe public art should enliven civic settings, spark collective imagination, and honor the spirit of place. This conviction, shaped through both professional and personal experience, inspires our enthusiastic response to the Los Alamos lion sculpture RFQ.

Our connection to New Mexico is long-standing and meaningful. Daniel has visited the state for over twenty-five years, with family residing in Santa Fe. Together, we have exhibited in the Santa Fe art fair, shown work in New Mexico galleries, and have a major exhibition scheduled for 2027. We know Los Alamos well, having visited multiple times—most recently in June—and are genuinely familiar with its unique blend of scientific achievement, storied landscapes, and natural wonder. The Valles Caldera National Preserve is a family favorite, and the East Fork Jemez River Trail holds particular spiritual significance for us. This enduring resonance with the region compels us to bring our creative perspective and heartfelt respect to a public sculpture meant to accompany the Los Alamos Police Memorial Wall.

We approach this opportunity as a chance to honor the police and broader community of Los Alamos, while using our creative skills, art historical knowledge, and experience in integrated design to create a symbolic lion sculpture that will inspire residents for generations to come. We are fluent in stonework and metal fabrication, adept with digital design and engineering, and deeply aware of New Mexico's cultural and artistic movements. Our goal is to combine the innovation and technology emblematic of Los Alamos with the state's legendary enchantment and sense of place.

Our ability to realize bold, lasting artworks in public space is demonstrated in our portfolio. Projects such as The Water Guardians, installed in Toronto's Canary District, illustrate our approach to creating contemporary, site-responsive figures that serve as sentinels. These larger-than-life guardians stand as approachable, symbolically rich beacons, fabricated from highly durable materials. The project highlights how we balance visual strength and technical durability with cultural meaning and environmental stewardship—key qualities for the Los Alamos lion.

Similarly, Busy Beaver, a large-scale, near life-size wood sculpture, provides the strongest direct precedent for this project. Busy Beaver matches the lion's ideal dimensions) and demonstrates our expertise in animal form, approachable but dignified design, and site integration. The work embodies industriousness, resourcefulness, and natural intelligence—a spirit we would echo in Los Alamos by capturing both the majesty and symbolism of the African lion. The pose, geometric fabrication, and welcoming placement show our sensitivity to crafting works that function as focal points and enduring enhancements to their sites.

We are equally adept at works that integrate symbolism and robust material execution, as with Directions Intersections Connections—a relief mural weaving together local history, movement, and abstraction to create a visual landmark for the urban public. The Delta, a sculptural water feature in stainless steel and engineered elements, demonstrates our capacity for crafting enduring, transcendental installations designed for decades of outdoor exposure. For the Los Alamos lion, we are prepared to draw from both classical sculptural traditions and high-tech methodologies—always guided by context, appropriateness, and our commitment to a novel, dignified result.

Across all projects, we manage every phase—from concept and engineering through fabrication and installation—with thoughtful selection of materials expressly suited for exterior permanence. We understand the rigorous demands of public art and create with durability, safety, and ongoing public engagement in mind.

Our approach to the Los Alamos lion will be grounded in research, dialogue, and an attentive response to site context. We will collaborate closely with local stakeholders, honoring the solemnity of the surrounding Police Memorial Wall with a design that is bold, dignified, and inviting. The lion will serve as a powerful visual enhancement, bridging remembrance and renewal, tradition and innovation.

Description:

Installed adjacent to Sheppard West Station in Toronto, Dodecadandy addresses the space between the urban and suburban. A rational utopian form (a geodesic sphere) is contrasted against nature and growth from the dispersal of its scattered seeds.

A dandelion seed clock flows northward and a planting pattern follows its spores. The site is integrated thematically with a landscape plan that echoes the form and narrative of the sculpture; symbolizing urban growth, transitory migration, and regeneration.









• A Multidisciplinary, large scale, project of mixed-media elements, that are kinetic, electronic, and interactive. The project indicates an ability to synthesize sculpture and painting to find metaphorical allusions. And to work with materials and customize them for artistic effect.

Description:

Balancing Act consists of a user-controlled large-scale claw crane game where participants can stack sculptural components to create compositions. Accompanying the installation are paintings depicting combinations, portraits, and abstractions of the component shapes.

The beauty in the paintings is echoed in the historical lineage of claw-crane games through popular culture. Constructivism meets portraiture, meets mass media. *Balancing Act* refers to resource extraction, and the play between the artist and participant as subject.

Description:

The RFP for this project called for a 'living room' space and child-friendly zone in the West Don Lands Village (Canary District) of Toronto. The three figures stand as personifications of water, as sentinels and guardians of the water-ways of Toronto.

Previously a site of industrial contamination, this area has been remediated. *The Water Guardians* stand guard over the district, they form an arch over a river-way-walk-way; and their eyes light up at night – standing as a beacon protecting the neighborhood and the environment.

Description:

The Molecule Trees frame the entrance of the hospital. The sculpture relates to the adjacent architectural glass and its theme of trees in a forest where diversity creates a unified whole - a community and an ecosystem. The sculpture pays tribute to the rational nature of science and medicine, and the quest for solutions at the molecular level. Realized as a geometry of nestled forms, the sculpture is in bloom, its chemical compounds symbolic of a tree that bears fruit. The sculptures are integrated within the landscape design of the hospital and the hospital's narrative of diversity and togetherness - a social forest.







The Eddy, Rite of Passage Completed 2018



Description:

The Eddy is a social sculpture that is part of a linear park that expresses the watershed themes of the Fraser River Delta. Formal language such as: the passage, the eddy, and the delta, are made into sculptural forms. The linear park also contains over 200m of 'art screens' that are installed in various locations along the park. The Eddy is an undulating steel structure that is at once a hammock, a play structure, and a social hub. Based on swirling river eddies, the sculpture's centrifugal form is enjoyed by people of all ages. Tying into the woven art screen that wraps around the pocket park, the netting of the sculpture reinforces social cohesiveness and interaction.







The Delta, Rite of Passage Completed 2018

Description:

The Delta in Charles Street Pocket Park is a place of rest, atmosphere, and reflection. This sculptural water feature ascends with a welcoming embrace. The Delta creates a visual and aural screen for the park, calming and replacing the sights and sounds of traffic with cascading water. The Delta's white tubes resemble river tributaries, as water flows from them onto shimmering and faceted stainless-steel rock-like forms. This sculptural installation takes transcendental inspiration from the Fraser River Watershed. The entirety of the linear park symbolizes the region's splendour and encapsulates it in human scale.









Description:

Using the technological language of outdoor advertising communications: the LED screen Speech Bubble is a tool for dialogue and contemplation. Cantilevering audaciously from the ground, it gives voice to a new privately developed public space in Toronto's entertainment district. The speech bubble frame, as a symbol, represents spoken text, yet the LED screen plays a history of geometric abstract art.

The sculpture is integrated with the techno landscape theme of Rosenberg Studio's public square, and is selected as an example of integrated art and landscape.

Description:

Directions Intersections Connections symbolizes place, in the context of time, distance, and transport. This integrated relief mural expresses the greater Danforth area through motion, the intersections of communities, and connections to both the present and the past.

Farming fields, city blocks, the Woodbine Raceway, nodes of transit maps, the Don River, and an abstract cityscape blend into each other. From an oblique view, a vibrant wash of color is created by bright vertical fins, expressing concepts of abstraction, measurement, and animation.

Description:

The Ball is in Your Court solves the problem of mitigating acoustical issues in a huge athletic facility, while integrating an artistic program into an architectural setting. These large-format paintings are made on acoustic panels, and tell a story of colorful component pieces of a basketball court vying for space, as expressed through the motion lines used in cartoon drawings and sports play-books to form a story.

Description:

Busy Beaver invites students to sit on its logs as a respite from daily academic life. The beaver, Canada's national animal, symbolizes industriousness, creativity, and the inherent intelligence of nature. This faceted wood beaver has gnawed through the adjacent logs in a systematic and programmed manner, producing geometric carvings. The digital "byte" alludes to the paradox of intelligence in nature, compared with computer intelligence inherent in the sculpture's design. Busy Beaver cleverly references new frontiers for innovation and creativity, while nodding to Canada's natural heritage.
