## A. OVERALL THEMES

#### 1. DESIGN & AESTHETICS

• Common praise: Some liked the bright colors, detailed wildlife, and energy of the murals.

#### Common criticism:

- o "Too busy" or cluttered: Many feel the murals are visually overwhelming.
- "Disjointed and disproportionate": Elements like animals and landscapes feel pasted together without flow or scale.
- "Tacky or gaudy": Strong objections to what some called "graffiti-like," "cartoonish," or "cheap."
- Mismatch with Los Alamos: Several say designs look like generic Southwest art rather than specific to Los Alamos.

#### 2. CONTENT ACCURACY & REPRESENTATION

#### Flora & fauna:

- Roadrunner criticism: Widely mentioned as inaccurate; "we don't have them here."
- Requests for more representative wildlife: Bears, deer, elk, mountain lions, coyotes, woodpeckers, local birds (e.g., raven, towhee).
- Plant realism: Saguaros and desert motifs were rejected; people asked for ponderosa pines, aspens, and piñon.

#### Cultural & scientific representation:

- Many asked to reflect Los Alamos's scientific and historical identity LANL, the
   Manhattan Project, or cultural heritage like petroglyphs or Pueblo art.
- Some asked for local or indigenous artists to be involved or featured.

## 3. LOCATION & SUITABILITY

#### Justice Center wall:

- o Concerns about visibility and driver distraction.
- Objection to drawing attention to the jail.
- o Some think this location deserves something more "serious" or appropriate to its function.

#### 4. SPENDING & PRIORITIZATION

#### • Opposition to cost:

Many objected to the \$55,000 price tag, citing better uses for funds (housing, healthcare, infrastructure).

A few described this as "wasteful," "elitist," or "out of touch."

#### **COMMUNITY PREFERENCES & RECOMMENDATIONS**

## **Design Adjustments:**

- Use local flora & fauna: deer, bear, elk, acorn woodpecker, piñon jay, etc.
- Replace or remove:
  - Roadrunner (seen as inaccurate)
  - Saguaros and other desert imagery
  - o "Glitches" or scribbles (seen as random or distracting)
- Make it cohesive: Improve proportion and composition.
- **Simplify**: Fewer elements, better flow, more calm visuals.

## Representation:

- Add Los Alamos-specific identity:
  - Science symbols (lab, satellites, discoveries)
  - Cultural heritage (Pueblo symbols, petroglyphs)

#### **FINAL TAKEAWAYS**

This feedback reflects a **divided but engaged community**, with strong interest in *place-specific*, cohesive, and meaningful public art that reflects **Los Alamos's identity—nature**, **science**, and **culture**. However, the current designs are widely seen as **too generic**, **busy**, **or off-message**.

#### Conclusion

**Plants and Trees** 

- Majority (58%) want changes/additions to better reflect Los Alamos-specific nature, culture, and identity.
- Common critique: Current designs don't reflect the real Los Alamos—either ecologically, culturally, or aesthetically.
- Top requests: More mountain wildlife (bear, elk, deer, coyote), ponderosa/aspen trees, and symbols tied to Los Alamos or NM culture.

# D. Analysis of Q5

"Is there anything in your preferred design you would like to see removed or changed?"

**Total Responses Analyzed: 70** 

Responses Suggesting a Change or Removal: 36

Responses Indicating No Change Needed (e.g., "No", "N/A"): 34

#### Criticism of Inaccurate Flora

Saguaro cactus mentioned multiple times as inappropriate for Los Alamos:

"We don't have saguaro cactus in these parts... not a cartoon representation of what people think the southwest looks like."

Desire for mountain landscape over desert motifs

#### **Animal-Related Critiques**

## **Animal/Symbol Comment Summary**

Roadrunner Multiple mentions that it's **not commonly seen in Los Alamos**; seen as inaccurate.

Western Tanager Suggested removal in favor of raven.

Dove One suggestion to **ditch the dove**, replace with **mountain bluebird**.

Birds in General Comments on disproportionate size or awkward positioning.

Animal Sizing Frequent concern about scale not matching surrounding elements.

#### **Calls for Better Local Representation**

Design doesn't reflect Los Alamos:

"Cactus is more natural to parts of NM south of us but not really Los Alamos."

• More cultural or community-based content requested:

# Conclusion

- Roughly half the respondents want changes, mostly to make the design more realistic, locally accurate, and visually cohesive.
- Key removals requested: **saguaro cacti**, **scribbles**, **disproportionate animals**, and **elements viewed as not reflecting Los Alamos**.
- There is **no strong consensus** on style (abstract vs realistic), but accuracy to **local nature and culture** is a unifying theme.
