

15281-21 Food Waste Composting Feasibility Study Update

The ESB received an update from SCS Engineers Tracie Bills, Michelle Leonard, and Craig Coker on the Compost Feasibility Study. The presentation included information on existing and projected organics feedstock, compost recipes, technologies, markets, best management practices, available sites, and permitting requirements.

Discuss County Council Outcome of the ESB Recommendation regarding Pesticide Use by the County

**Presenters:** Erik Loechell

The ESB discussed the outcome of the County Council meeting in which the Council accepted the ESB recommendation to ban the use of Glyphosate by Los Alamos County with an amendment to integrated pest management. They directed staff to implement these changes and return to Council within 90 days for the consideration of approval of an implementation plan and potential follow up budget actions. The board discussed the next steps that the Council may take and requested a progress report on the integrated pest management plan from the Community Services Department in February 2022.

# C. Los Alamos Resiliency Energy and Sustainability Task Force - Dina Pesenson

Vice-Chair Pesenson reported that the County Council requested that the LARES Task Force make some changes to the formatting of subcommittee plan layout. Angelica Gurule reported that the Task Force is wrapping up the final report to be delivered to the Council in February 2022. They have also been working to get input from various County Departments.

## 1). Board of Public Utilities - Jessie Emerson

Member Emerson reported that items discussed at the December BPU meeting included the community wide power outage that occurred, funding for the free power project to cover lobbying expenses, funding for painting a water tower and what the costs would cover. The Board also conducted a self evaluation with the conclusion that there needs to be more open discussions at meetings and more outreach within the community outreach and involvement. They discussed that 2% sewer rate increase over the next two years will help cover the replacement of sewer hubs. Jordan Garcia presented information on the Uniper Project and the Board discussed the need for a long-term power plan. The current plan is for 33 months and will be evaluated near the end of this plan. They will also have future discussions on solar power storage, the Chromium Plume presentation and a conservation program update.

# NEW MEXICO OPEN MEETINGS ACT & INSPECTION OF PUBLIC RECORDS ACT

## KNOWN AS THE "SUNSHINE LAWS"

- All persons are entitled to the greatest possible information regarding the affairs of government and the official acts of those who represent them.
- The formation of public policy or the conduct of business by vote shall not be conducted in closed meetings.
- All meetings of a quorum of members of any board or commission, held for the purpose of formulating public policy, discussing public business for the purpose of taking any action within the authority of the commission are declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times, except as otherwise provided by law. See §10-15-1(B)
- Under IPRA, the law requires <u>open access to almost all public records</u> in state and local government, with few exceptions.



# Minutes

- Must be include the date, time and place of the meeting, the names of members in attendance and those absent, the substance of the proposals considered and a record of any decisions and votes taken that show how each member voted.
- All minutes are open to public inspection.
- Draft minutes shall be prepared within ten working days after the meeting and shall be approved, amended or disapproved at the next meeting where a quorum is present.

# OMA - MEETING MUST FOLLOW THE PUBLISHED AGENDA



- Only items listed on the published agenda may be discussed by the Board
- Public Comment
- Items for next meeting
- Ability to schedule Special Meeting

# OMA - "ROLLING" OR "WALKING" QUORUMS PROHIBITED

A quorum may exist, for purposes of the Act, even when members are not physically present together at the same time and place.





■ Example: 4 members of a 7-member Board discussing public business in a series of telephone or email conversations. Such discussion is a meeting of a quorum. The use of a rolling quorum to discuss public business or take action is a violation of the Act because it constitutes a meeting of a quorum of the Board outside a properly noticed public meeting.



# OMA - INVALID ACTIONS AND PENALTY

No action of a board shall be valid unless taken or made at a meeting held in accordance with the requirements of the OMA.

Any person violating any of the provisions of the OMA is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500) for each offense

# IPRA – INSPECTION OF PUBLIC RECORDS





- Every person has a right to inspect public records of this state except as specifically limited by law.
- All persons are entitled to the greatest possible information regarding the affairs of government and the official acts of public officers and employees.
- "Public Records" means <u>all</u> documents, papers, letters, books, maps, tapes, photographs, recordings and other materials, regardless of physical form or characteristics, that are used, created, received, maintained or held by or on behalf of any public body and <u>relate to public business</u>, whether or not the records are required by law to be created or maintained;

## ARTICLE X. ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY BOARD

## Sec. 8-231. Purpose.

The environmental sustainability board is established to serve as the central point of contact for environmental sustainability issues and as an advisory body to the county council on environmental sustainability issues.

(Ord. No. 02-078, § 2, 10-3-2006; Ord. No. 02-094, § 2, 6-10-08)

## Sec. 8-232. Membership, terms and qualifications.

The board shall consist of seven members. The members shall serve for staggered two-year terms beginning on August 1 and ending on July 31, except that three members on the initial board shall only serve for one-year terms.

(Ord. No. 02-078, § 2, 10-3-2006; Ord. No. 02-094, § 3, 6-10-08)

## Sec. 8-233. Duties and responsibilities.

The environmental sustainability board shall serve in an advisory capacity to the county council and shall have the following functions, responsibilities and duties:

- (1) Gather and provide citizen input to staff and council on ways to improve the county's environmental sustainability and on proposed environmental sustainability policies, programs and services. For this purpose, the board shall gather public input in ways appropriate to the circumstances.
- (2) Recommend ways to involve and educate the community on environmental sustainability issues.

  Review and comment on public involvement and information plans (PIIPs) related to environmental sustainability projects outside the department of public utilities.
- (3) Review and comment to council on environmental sustainability master plans.
- (4) Review all environmental sustainability related matters submitted to the board by council.
- (5) Coordinate with other boards as appropriate on environmental sustainability activities.

## **Body**

The ESB will review and discuss the November 2021 Residential Sustainability Report. The data now includes more data and graphs that will demonstrate overall diversion as a result of the new yard trimming program which began July 9, 2018. The report includes greenhouse gas emissions reduced by recycling and composting.

The yard trimming program has been in operation for 3 years and has been working very extremely well by helping the community divert yard trimming materials. As of December 12, 2021, participation includes 4,934 (72%) households. Environmental Services collected 826 tons of material, which is a 26% reduction from last year. The increase in materials seen in 2021 was during the height of the pandemic and can be attributed to residents cleaning their yards, home and garages.


