C. Board Member Reports

Member Heavner made follow up comments regarding the e-mail the board received concerning pedestrian crossings at 20th St. and Trinity Dr.

Member Altherr made comments regarding the pedestrian crossings.

Member Heavner shared with the board that he has been pursuing Electrification Transportation. He has been researching impacts to County, community, and the labs. He attended a conference regarding grid and electric transformational connections. As his research continues, he will share information with the board.

Member Altherr notified the board on his Traffic Incident Study (previously the Vehicle vs Wildlife Study). He met with Deputy Chief Morris to discuss the options of capturing information regarding where incidence take place and what are contributing factors. He invited board members to contribute information.

Member Strickfaden thanked staff for modifying the barriers on 20th and Rose St. Parking pads were removed to allow a safer access on sidewalks. She also wrote a letter responding to the public comments about pedestrian crossings at 20th St. and Trinity Dr

Member Strickfaden notified the board that the Tourism Implementation Task Force had met and went through the Progress Report which included transportation issues, wayfinding signs, and trailhead kiosks. She has requested an electric copy and will share with the board when she receives it.

Due to a shortage of contract workers, the Traffic & Streets
 Department has rented equipment, using the Pavement
 Preservation Funds, to allow them to do crack seal and asphalt maintenance this summer. They will be working on the downtown area in coming week.

 Annette Granillo, Transit Manager gave an update on the electric buses. The specifications have been completed and now they are looking into design options which will include charging stations, as well as alternative fuels.

Member Heavner asked clarifying questions regarding the I.T.S Systems on the busses. Ms. Granillo explained that the My-Stop Avail Vectors is the on-board computers / GPS system that is currently being used. The system is not working as well due to the age of the hardware. She is currently working on grants to obtain new software and hardware. The project is estimated to take 8-12 months.

Adopt-A-Roadway Requirements

- All liter pick up activities will be restricted to the areas of the right of way outside the pavement and shoulder areas.
- No person under the age of 12 will be permitted to pick up litter within the highway right of way. All persons between the ages of 12-18 must be accompanied and supervised by at least one adult.
- Each litter pick up must be scheduled with the Public Works Department to ensure proper coordination. The group shall obtain required signs, visible vests, and bags from the department during regular business hours. The group's representative prior to clean up should call the department to schedule a time to pick up and return the signs. (Only a limited number are available).
- Each group shall designate a Contact/Safety Representative and shall arrange for each member of the group to view the Adopt-A-Roadway Safety Video and sign the required waiver prior to the first scheduled litter pick-up. The representative will be responsible for safety meetings, and for obtaining and returning vests and signs.

Adopt-A-Roadway Requirements

- No litter pickup will be performed unless the adopting group has placed the appropriate advance warning signs.
- All persons engaged in litter pickup must wear an appropriate safety vest.
- The adopting group will dispose of all bags of litter as appropriate. (Coordinate with Environmental Services).


- Installation of identification signs
- Furnish a set of the appropriate advance warning signs.
- Furnish appropriate safety vests, gloves and litter bags.
- Provide adopting organization with safety information, literature, access to safety video and answer questions.
- If at the end of a nine-month period it is determined that the adopting organization has not conducted a cleanup activity, the County will cancel the agreement.



Agreement Provisions

Agreement Provisions

- 1. All participating group members will have reviewed the Safety Guidelines prior to any planned cleanups. It is the responsibility of the group coordinator to review the safety guidelines with the group members before cleanups. Potential dangers involved while participating in this program can include, but are not limited to high speed traffic. potentially noxious plants, broken glass, hazardous materials, sharp metal, and potentially harmful wildlife.
- 2. The group will notify the coordinator 14 days prior to a planned pickup.
- 3. Participating group agrees to restrict program activities to the area of right-of-way off the traveled portion of the roadway.
- 4. While performing activities on the right-of-way, the method, manner, and appearance of the participants will not in any way distract, disrupt, or adversely affect traffic. Participants may not display messages, carry banners, or advertise their business affiliation or cause.
- Los Alamos County prohibits the possession, consumption, or being under the influence of alcohol or drugs while performing work or litter pick up on Los Alamos County right-of-
- 6. Program activities will be conducted one hour after sunrise to one hour before sunset and not during inclement weather.
- 7. The group will notify the LAC Coordinator in the event of any group leader change within 30 days.
- 8. It is mandatory that all participants wear the bright colored safety vest that's provided by LAC.
- 9. Los Alamos County:
 - · Determines the specific section of right-a-way to be adopted
 - Installs and maintains signs
 - Provides group members with trash bags and safety vests
 - Provides Safety Guidelines to group coordinator
 - · Reserves the right to cancel any agreement due to failure to meet provisions of the program or for safety reasons.
 - Los Alamos County reserves the right to cancel or revoke a permit at its discretion. Permit revocation will result in removal of any signage associated with the agreement.

The Adopt-A-Roadway Program provides a great opportunity for both volunteer and sponsor groups to promote civic responsibility and community pride.

Welcome!

When you join Los Alamos County's Adopt-A-Roadway program, you become a vital part of a partnership that is dedicated to keeping Los Alamos clean and attractive. No special skills or experience are required – just a commitment to the community and concern for the environment.

What it means to join the Adopt-A-Roadway Program:

- Your group can select a segment of roadway you would like to sponsor. Groups can be family members, churches, businesses, organizations or even a group of friends!
- Your group agrees to pick up litter in your section of road at least two times per year, following all the safety guidelines in your agreement.
- This program is a two-year commitment, with the option to renew your agreement at the end of each term. (Or 3 years to include Keep Los Alamos Clean event).
- Your group's name will be placed on the County's website recognizing your contribution to the Adopt-A-Roadway Program.

How to Get Started

- 1. Organize your group and get commitments before you submit your application.
- 2. Contact Los Alamos County for more information about adopting a segment within the county.
- 3. Complete the permit application and submit it to the Public Works Department.
- 4. A coordinator will notify you when the application is approved and will assist you in getting started.

Adopt-A-Roadway Requirements

A group requesting to adopt a segment of roadway for litter control agrees to comply with the following requirements:

- All litter pick up activities will be restricted to the areas of the right of way outside the pavement and shoulder areas.
- No person under the age of 12 will be permitted to pick up litter within the highway right
 of way. All persons between the ages of 12 and 18 must be accompanied and
 supervised by at least one adult per 5 persons under the age of 18.
- Each group shall designate a Contact/Safety Representative who shall arrange for each member of the group to view the Adopt-A-Roadway Safety Video prior to the first scheduled litter pick up. That representative will be responsible for safety meetings, and for obtaining and returning vests and signs.
- Each scheduled litter pick must be scheduled with the Public Works Department to ensure proper coordination. The group shall obtain required signs, visible vests, and bags from the department during regular business hours. The group's representative, prior to clean up, should call the department to schedule a time to pick up and return the signs. (Only a limited number are available). A safety meeting will be conducted by the County's Traffic Safety Specialist prior to each scheduled litter pick up. In this meeting, the members of the group will be apprised of the hazardous nature of the work that they will be performing. Periodic review of the Safety Video is recommended.
- No litter pick up will be performed unless the group has placed the appropriate advance warning signs. Public Works will furnish the appropriate signs.
- All persons engaged in litter pick up will wear an appropriate safety vest. Public Works will furnish the appropriate vest.
- Vests and unused bags furnished by the department shall be returned to the department after each clean-up session.
- The adopting group will dispose of all bags of litter as appropriate. (Coordinate with Environmental Services.)
- If is further understood by the adopting group that the Public Works Department will:
 - Furnish a set of appropriate advance warning signs (to be set up and maintained in place during litter pick up activities by the adopting group) when available.
 - Furnish appropriate safety vests, gloves and litter bags for all persons involved in litter pick up for the adopting group.
 - Meet with Transportation Safety Specialist prior to each scheduled pick up to provide safety information, literature, access to safety video, and answer questions.
 - If at the end of a nine-month period it is determined that the adopting organization has not conducted a cleanup activity, the department will cancel their agreement.



Adopt-A-Road Coordinator

The County's Adopt-A-Road Coordinator is the Transportation Safety Specialist in the Traffic & Streets Division.

The coordinator is responsible for assisting with identifying adoptable segments of road, obtaining approval of work plans, and processing the permit application. The coordinator will also assure that participants fulfill their permit obligations. The coordinator is available Monday through Friday between 9:00 am and 3:00 pm. to explain the details and assist you with getting the program started.

Potential dangers involved while participating in this program can include, but are not limited to; high speed traffic, fumes, noxious plants, broken glass, hazardous materials, sharp metal, harmful wildlife, errant golf balls, tripping, and falling.
- 2. The group will notify the Adopt-A-Road Coordinator 14 days prior to a planned pickup event.
- 3. Participating group agrees to restrict program activities to the area of right-of-way off the traveled portion of the roadway.
- 4. While performing activities on the right-of-way, the method, manner, and appearance of the participants will not in any way distract, disrupt, or adversely affect traffic.
- 5. Program activities will only be conducted during day between the following timeframe: one hour after sunrise to one hour before sunset and not during inclement weather.
- 6. The group will notify the Adopt-A-Road Coordinator in the event of any group leader change within 30 days.
- 7. It is mandatory that all participants wear the bright colored safety vest provided by LAC.
- 8. Los Alamos County:
 - Determines the specific section of right-a-way to be adopted
 - Installs and maintains signs
 - Provides group members with trash bags and safety vests
 - Provides Safety Guidelines to group coordinator
 - Reserves the right to cancel any agreement due to failure to meet provisions of the program or for safety reasons.
 - Los Alamos County reserves the right to cancel or revoke a permit at its discretion.

Consistent with the Council strategic priority to invest in infrastructure, the Engineering Division has been actively managing multiple construction projects across the county. These construction projects are in the final stages with many of them in closeout with punch list work underway.

News & Updates

The Sherwood Boulevard project was completed in November with only punch list work remaining. The Canyon Road project is in closeout.

The 33rd/34th and Arkansas project was advertised for construction with the evaluation committee recommending award at Council on November 29th.

Staff has been involved in development inspections and design reviews for the Arbolada Subdivision on North Mesa, the Arkansas Townhomes, and the Hills Apartments.

A survey was mailed to the residents in NC3 to identify any issues and gather information on how well they are working to reduce bear encounters and to gauge customer satisfaction. We received 120 responses from the survey and results will be analyzed and presented to County Council in a future meeting.

News & Updates

The Environmental Sustainability Board meeting, November 17, 2022, was held in Council Chambers and via Zoom. The ESB received a presentation from Board Member Hermann Geppert on How Do We Get More People on Bikes in Los Alamos County. County Council also appointed two new members, Kokheong McNaughton and Armand Groffman.

The Zero Waste Team did not meet in November but continue to publish Zero Waste articles emphasizing waste reduction for the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday.

Connecting with the Public

Recycle Coach app is a great asset for residents to check collection schedules and use the 'What Goes Where' search tool for recycle questions. The number one customer interaction is collection day reminders and real time notifications.

Yard Trimming collection officially began March 14, 2022 and as of November 21, 2022, Environmental Services has collected over 813 tons of material. The yard trimming roll cart is for organic yard trimmings only, which includes short branches, flowers, grass clippings, leaves, pine needles and pinecones. Residents are allowed one cart per household. Register for a Yard Trimming Cart online at www.losalamosnm.us/gogreen

Looking Ahead

Environmental Services collects yard trimming carts spring through fall with no collection during the winter months. The final day of yard trimming collection will be the week of December 9, 20222. Environmental Services Division will provide Christmas tree collection January 3-6th and January 17-20th. Yard trimming collection will begin again on March 27, 2023.






October Diversion Rate: 24%


The diversion rate is the percent of recyclable and compostable material diverted from the landfill.

Meeting Our Goals

In accordance with the strategic goal to invest in infrastructure, Capital Projects & Facilities staff focus on maintaining County facilities. Facilities maintenance responses to power outages included disruptions to controls at the Mesa Public Library and Justice Center.

Toward the goal of improving our recreational amenities, staff continue to advance recreation projects in their various stages of planning, design, and construction, including the Leisure Lagoon, Improvements at the Golf Course, North Mesa Shared-Use Gym, and Tennis Complex.

News & Updates

Staff and the design team presented the Tennis Complex project to the Parks and Recreation Board November 10, 2022, where Overlook Park was the location put forward as a recommendation to Council. Project information can be found at following link: https://www.losalamosnm.us/government/departments/public_works/public_works_projects

In October, Phase 1 of the Golf Course project advertised for bid. Phase 1 includes improving Holes 4 through 18, to include tees, bunkers, greens, permanent restrooms, targeted cart path upgrades and deferred maintenance. State law requires contactors to hold a New Mexico contractor's license to be eligible to submit a bid. The time to obtain a license is currently taking six to eight weeks. The bid opening date was extended to November 29, 2022 to allow time for interested out-of-state contractors to obtain a New Mexico license.

Facilities staff have been working at several locations to repair controls and failed equipment, some related to the recent power issues. One was the Justice Center 911 Server room air conditioning unit which suffered a compressor failure. Exterior lighting at the Golf course was checked and repaired to ensure sufficient lighting for patrons in the evening hours.

Connecting with the Public

On a sunny Thursday, November 17, Public Works staff and the golf course design team met with the community for an in-person site visit of the golf course to review Phase 2 design concepts on the ground. Phase 2 of the project includes development of several design concept options for improving Holes 1 through 3, reconfiguring the driving range to improve safety, and other improvements such as practice area and cart path upgrades.

Looking Ahead

The construction contract for Phase 1 of the Golf Course project is anticipated to be on the December 6, 2022 Council agenda for consideration of award.



Meeting Our Goals

Airport - The airport continues to work toward improving the transportation infrastructure in the County. This past year aircraft maintenance has been restored at the airport, a new weather station has been installed, preliminary engineering is being completed on the Taxiway F Relocation Safety project, and steps are underway to update aircraft fueling and establish Jet A fuel service.

Atomic City Transit continues to move forward with LSC Transportation Consults, Inc on the update to the Atomic City Transit Comprehensive Transportation Study and five-year Service Plan update. The consultants have provided Atomic City Transit staff a draft technical report regarding all the statistical information regarding public transportation within Los Alamos County including stakeholder and community comments. LSC Transportation Consults will be preparing a summary recommendation report in the month of December 2023.

News & Updates

Airport - The new Aviation Weather Observation System (AWOS) has been installed and commissioned by the FAA. This system was fully grant funded by the NMDOT. The manufacturer, Mesotech, has been in business since 1993 working primarily with military customers in the US. This is the first time this system has been installed at a civilian airport in New Mexico.

The bid opening for the fuel farm was conducted Nov 17th. The County received one bid. The NMDOT provided \$1.9 million in grant funding for this project. The bid, not including GRT or a contingency, exceeds this amount by \$271,035.00. Staff continues to evaluate this project for possible options to proceed.

Transit - Purchase of the two electric buses and charging stations continue to undergo contract negotiations. As these contract negotiations are completed and the order gets placed, we can expect the new buses in about 12 to 18 months from the date of order. With the increase interest of electric powered buses throughout the United States, work production has been delayed.

Bandelier Shuttle Service is complete for the 2022 season. Bandelier National Monument is open to the public to drive into the park 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. Monday through Sunday.

The seasonal ridership for 2023 was healthy. The graph below shows ridership by month from mid-May 2022 through mid-October 2022.












