

What is the Issue?

- NM502 Congestion increased earlier this year during Afternoon Peak Period (4:30 5:30)
- Roadway merges from 2 lanes down to 1 lane.
- Traffic backs up from Anytime Fitness Driveway (195 E. Rd) thru Roundabout and along Trinity Dr. and Central Ave.






What has Changed?

Increased Traffic during Afternoon Peak Period Eastbound (EB) Traffic Volumes due to:

- Additional Traffic Diverting from Truck Route due to NM4/Jemez Rd Construction
- Possible Changes in LANL and other Businesses Work Schedules (Reduction in Telecommuting)
- Additional construction projects across County





How can we Increase Capacity?

- Congestion is exacerbated by the following conditions and driver behaviors:
 - Merging too soon after exiting the roundabout.
 - Stopping/Slowing to let vehicles exit Anytime Fitness Driveway
 - Stopping/Slowing for pedestrians crossing at crosswalks






Zipper Merge

Commonly deployed in Construction Zones when there is a lane closure

When a lane is closed in a construction zone, a zipper merge occurs when motorists use both lanes of traffic until reaching the defined merge area, and then alternate in "zipper" fashion into the open lane.

A zipper merge is a more efficient way for traffic to proceed towards a construction zone. It reduces differences in speeds between two lanes. It also reduces the overall length of a traffic backup by as much as 40 percent. Besides reducing congestion, it also creates a sense of fairness since all lanes are moving at the same rate.

Meeting Our Goals

The airport manager has been actively reviewing open projects to continue to close out grants as quickly as possible, especially any COVID relief funding. The FAA CIP meeting will be conducted on May 22^{nd} , this will give staff opportunity to work with the airport consultants and the FAA project manager to review upcoming funding requests for projects that align with the airport master plan.

News & Updates

The airport manager travelled to Ruidoso to participate in the annual New Mexico Airport Manager's Association conference. During that time, she networked with fellow airport managers across the state, as well as attended informative sessions with state legislators and FAA officials.

Connecting with the Public

The airport was contacted by the local YMCA to inquire about hosting a group of 7th-9th graders during the summer. During the days selected, the kids will help clean up the airport by pulling weeds and picking up litter; at the end of their shift, local pilots will spend time with them teaching them about aviation. The kids will also be able to learn about the Dragonfly aircraft the local EAA Chapter is currently constructing; the dragonfly is a 2-seater lightweight electric aircraft. The EAA Chapter is hopeful the aircraft will be ready in order to participate in the Pulitzer Electric Aircraft Race scheduled for May 2024.

Los Alamos County dedicated a memorial on Friday, May 19 at the Los Alamos County Airport to commemorate the tragic crash of Ross Aviation Flight 7 that took the lives of the pilot and eight Lab employees 51 years ago.



News & Updates

In the past month, Facilities maintenance staff have been busy. Some of the tasks completed include installing new Smokey the Bear fire dangers signs at Fire Stations 3 and 4, repairing doors at North Mesa sports complex restrooms, addressing multiple plumbing issues at various facilities, and installation of a new bottle filling station at the White Rock Visitors Center. Facilites staff also replaced a heat pump at the Aquatic Center to correct office heating issues. Facility electricians handled multiple electrical issues from repairing several "shoreline" outlets for Fire engine equipment and repairing lighting bollards in front of the Justice Center. Staff have also been conducting interviews to fill several vacancies within the division.

In reviewing the work order history over the last year, Facilities maintenance staff have reduced the total number of work orders from over 400 to less than 300. This positive trend shows staff's commitment to working through a backlog of aging work orders. In addition to focusing on completing older work orders, staff continue to keep up with projects requests and work order requests for emergency and non-emergency situations.

News & Updates - continued

Project Management staff continue to work on a list of nearly 60 projects, many of which are internal to the County for facility renewal and improvements. Last month, construction started at the White Rock Visitor Center to improve water pressure and function of the restrooms. Construction is expected to be complete at the end of June and will involve periodic water outages and lack of access to the restrooms during construction. Potable water is still accessible in the building to staff and visitors. Temporary portable restrooms will be provided. We appreciate everyone's patience while we work to make these improvements. Additionally, staff is working on projects for four office remodels in the Municipal Building to keep up with changing staffing office needs. Staff are making progress to provide a temporary ice rink chiller for the 2023-2024 skating season, while permanent replacement options are being investigated.

Connecting with the Public

Project Management staff held a public meeting on May 9, 2023, to review the schematic design for the golf course project with interested stakeholders. The public meeting was hybrid and attended by interested parties both in person and on-line. Altogether, the meeting provided an open forum for staff and the Design Team to update the public on the status of the project, to hear and receive comments, and answer questions about the design and status of the project. The next steps for the project are to complete the design in June, bid the project in July/August to be prepared for construction in March of 2024. Contractors make their construction commitments early, thus, to have a contractor ready to complete the work, contracting must occur several months in advance.

Bids were received for the Barranca Mill and Overlay project advertised for bids in April. This project includes a partial depth asphalt removal followed by an overlay of new asphalt on Barranca Mesa beginning on San Ildefonso Road just north of the roundabout, continuing to Navajo Road. Staff have completed bid evaluations and will request award at Council on May 23rd.

The $33^{rd}/34^{th}$ Street and Arkansas continues construction in with roadway subgrade preparation underway.

May was Bike Month with a proclamation occurring at Council on May 2^{nd} . Public Works organized Bike to Work Day on May 17^{th} with a morning event near Sullivan Field and evening activities held at the SALA Convention Center.

The scope of work includes a partial depth asphalt removal followed by an overlay of new asphalt on Barranca Mesa beginning on San Ildefonso Road just north of the roundabout, continuing to Navajo Road.
33rd/34th Street and Arkansas Project	PW	Construction continues by TLC Plumbing and Utility. The project scope includes new water lines and storm drain, upgrading existing sewer lines, isolated concrete replacement, and full reconstruction of roadway. Substantial Completion is anticipated in late September.
Urban Trail Phase I and II	PW	The design package is being finalized and bid documents in process for advertisement in early June for a construction start in Fall 2023. Scope of work includes construction of a 10-ft wide concrete multi-use trail from Trinity Drive northwards to Canyon Road and ending near the Aquatic Center.
DP Road Phase II	PW	A single bid received on January 25 th was over available budget. Project will be readvertised later in the year with some modifications of the project scope likely. The current project scope includes new sewer and gas lines, electric conduit, storm drain, concrete replacement, and full reconstruction of roadway.
Loma Linda Road Improvements	PW	This final design is underway with bidding anticipated in late 2023. The scope of work for this new project involves full reconstruction of the Loma Linda subdivision roadway infrastructure. A public meeting will be held in June 2023.
Rose Street	PW	The scope of work for this project involves full reconstruction of Rose Street from Central to Peach. This is a joint project with the Department of Public Utilities and includes full road reconstruction along with utility upgrades. The final design is underway with bidding anticipated in late 2023. A public meeting was held in May 2023.
Trinity Safety and ADA	PW	The study phase design alternatives are nearing completion by Wilson & Company, with a public input meeting anticipated in June 2023. The scope of work for this includes a study phase followed by design and construction. This project is the result of a 2016 road safety audit and has been awarded Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) by NMDOT. Construction is anticipated in 2025.
Finch Street	PW	This project design is nearing completion by an engineering on-call with right-of-way acquisitions in progress.
Canyon Rim Trail Phase	PW	This project design will be completed by an engineering on-call upon completion of right-of-way/easement acquisitions.

Meeting Our Goals

SCS Engineers has provided two initial site plans for the area where the food waste composting windrow system will be operated in Bayo Canyon near the existing biosolids facility. Environmental Services continues to look at additional sites for the facility and hopes to have one chosen in the next couple of months. The next step is to have an environmental assessment of the site then a final site plan. The program is estimated to divert 4,500 tons of food and yard trimming materials from the landfill and transform it into valuable compost material.

Operation Save the Bears - 260 dumpsters have been delivered to the business community. 480 bear resistant roll carts were delivered to North Community 3 (NC3) in August 2022. A bear cart survey of NC3 was conducted to understand the effectiveness of the carts and overall customer satisfaction. This data was presented to County Council on February 28, 2023, and staff were directed to offer bear carts upon request only. An order has been placed for an additional 360 bear resistant roll carts and this order includes a 65-gallon option.

News & Updates

On February 3, 2023, Environmental Services transitioned from a weekly Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) drop off schedule to a monthly schedule. The fourth collection was held on May 5, 2023. Los Alamos County's contractor ACT Enviro had trained personnel on site to characterize and properly sort the material from 85 residents that was then transported to the proper disposal facilities. The next event will be held on Friday June 2, 2023.

Connecting with the Public


Recycle Coach app is a great asset for residents to check collection schedules and use the 'What Goes Where' search tool for recycling questions. The main customer interaction is collection day reminders and real time notifications.

Los Alamos Environmental Services partnered with the Sustainability Managers Office, Environmental Sustainability Board and the Zero Waste team to present at the 2023 Water Festival. The team discussed greenhouse gas emissions and how to reduce your carbon footprint with fourth graders from Los Alamos Schools.

Looking Ahead

Environmental Services will be installing a reuse center at Overlook Convenience Center in the coming months. This reuse center is made possible with funding from a New Mexico Clean and Beautiful Grant. The slab has been poured and the metal building that was previously used to store household hazardous waste will be disassembled and transported from the Eco Station to Overlook where it will be reassembled for the center. Keep your eyes open for a ribbon cutting in the next couple months.



We met county council goals by providing service to the community during the month of May by beginning streetlight bulb replacement, and pothole & concrete repairs due to harsh winter conditions.

News & Updates

Crews have been repairing damaged concrete at several locations in the county.

Administrative staff have been working with contractors and event planners getting ready for construction and summer events traffic countywide.

Traffic electricians completed relocation of the trail lighting conduits on the Canyon Trail. Electricians also installed new battery backup system at the intersections of Trinity and 7th St., Trinity Dr., and Knecht St., Trinity Dr. and 15th St., and Trinity Dr. and Oppenheimer St. They have begun to replace streetlights with LED lights in White Rock.

Electricians removed and replaced 2 streetlight poles on Los Pueblos with shorter poles and LED fixtures.

Electricians installed new runway end identifiation lights (REIL) at the Airport and new obstruction lights on the public works hanger.

Transportation Safety is working with new hires to prepare for commercial drivers license (CDL) testing. CDL drivers are hard to find, our office is training new hires and Transit is performing the testing.

The signs and markings crew continue striping roads, curbs, and county owned parking lots. They began in White Rock and are presently working in the townsite. Depending on weather and product availability, this project may last through the middle of Summer.

Signs crews eradicated skip lines on Diamond Drive to correct wrong patterns done by contractors.

Crews have been performing vegetation control countywide.

Looking Ahead

Crews will continue to repair potholes, maintain vegetation and work with the public for traffic control for special county sponsored events.

Crews have identified several locations in need of asphalt and concrete repairs, we have issued task orders with on-call contractors to perform the work throughout the summer months.




News & Updates




